#### Interpreting the Bible

Finding the right interpretation of the Bible is a vital matter for every Christian and for every Church. In the last forty years the subject of interpretation (sometimes called hermeneutics) has been the subject of much discussion and debate. Some say that, if you study the Bible in a sincere and honest way, you will have no difficulty in discovering the meaning. However, in practice this does not seem to be the case. Christians equally loyal to the Bible have arrived at very different views of what it commands them to do. Baptism, Church governance, issues in human sexuality are just a few issues on which equally Biblical Christians are deeply divided.

Inevitably we all come to study the Bible with our minds partly made up. However hard we try to be objective, we are deeply influenced by past experiences and the circle of friends to which we belong. For example, a Guardian-reading Christian is likely to approach the Bible with different preconceptions from those in the mind of a Daily Telegraph reader! A cautious personality is likely to come to the Bible with a different approach from an adventurous personality.

What I have just written may seem very pessimistic to some people. In fact, I don't think there is any need to be pessimistic. God will help us understand the truth. The Holy Spirit has been given to help us understand what God is saying to us through the Bible. So we must allow the Holy Spirit to challenge our presuppositions. We must read the Bible prayerfully, asking God to show us his truth.

We are sensible to think through the Bible in company with other Christians. As we hear and read what other Christians have found in the scriptures, we will develop a surer understanding of Christian truth. In my previous parish we had a series of home groups which met regularly to pray and to deepen their understanding of the Bible. They found this very helpful. Similarly, by reading books or listening to podcasts from wise Christians who themselves are students of the Bible we can learn much.

We'll not understand the message of the Bible through reason alone. We need the help of the Holy Spirit and the help of other Christians. A true understanding of God's truth requires Scripture, our own thinking, the help of the Holy Spirit and a fervent desire on our part to know and do God's will. Of course, sincere Christians equally filled with the Holy Spirit will come to different conclusions on various matters, but they will need to do so with a holy tolerance and the humility to realise that they do not have a complete and infallible understanding of all God's truth.

#### PENINSULA GAMES - 6TH JULY 2022



Excitement and anticipation were in the air as more than 500 children had numbers pinned on T-shirts, flags began to wave, and cheers echoed around for the spectacle of the 2022 "Peninsula Games" on Wednesday 6th July. This was held on the playing fields, tennis courts and in the hall at Cartmel Priory CofE secondary school. It was expertly led by Mr Ian Nicol (Head-teacher of Leven Valley School) and wonderfully supported by the local primary school PE co-ordinators, the other head-teachers and many staff members from the secondary school. In addition, there were many of the older pupils from Cartmel who acted brilliantly as "the games-makers" assisting in numerous ways with a huge variety of activities, sports and games in which all the primary school children could participate, and fully enjoy. As well as competitive athletics, the children were grouped in small cohorts to experience as many as 20 different "taster sports" such as table tennis, hockey, badminton and cycling.

To commence the games, all the school children from the seven local primary schools marched around the running track watched by hundreds of spectators. They were accompanied by sports celebrities, Craig Heap (former British gymnast champion), Bethan Lishman (Para-olympian hammer thrower), Rennell Brennan (off-road triathlete who has represented GB), and local former professional and England women's footballer, Kelsey Pearson from Flookburgh, all of whom inspired and demonstrated their sporting talents with pupils. The closing ceremony brought everyone together when Lucy Cavendish from Holker Hall presented medals, trophies and certificates.

Throughout the day, children were enthusiastic and well behaved, and all went home rather tired, but having experienced and enjoyed a wonderful occasion. This was their start to the understanding of the forthcoming Commonwealth Games to be held in Birmingham next month.

#### MARCHING AND WALTZING WITH CHARLES

Charles's latest concert in St Paul's at end-July was a further most enjoyable morning with a varied collection of works by the masters from Giuseppe Verdi and Frederic Chopin through to Eric Coates, Dave Brubeck and Mons Leidvin Tackle. Our foots tapped and our fingers twitched.

If two of the roles that music plays are to cause enjoyment and to evoke moods or scenes, then these were present in spades. The Chopin *Waltz in A minor* reminded me of a cosy BBC1 Sunday night serial of a Jane Austen novel with a doughty Army officer viewing whether a racy subaltern would be a suitable match for his daughter. The Satié waltz evoked "a seedy and smoke-filled Parisian café" (shades of Mme Edith in '*Allo* '*Allo*). Piernés *March of the little lead soldiers* took me to a children's nursery. Of course, the final item – Eric Coates' march *Calling all Workers* - took many in the audience back to our post-Second World War years when the radio was virtually our only form of entertainment.

All pieces were interpreted with sympathy and skill by Charles, accompanied by Eileen as stop-gap page-turner and (this time) stop-puller when required. We are fortunate that Charles devotes his time and his artistry to entertaining us. Just under 40 people enjoyed

their morning, accompanied by coffee/tea and refreshments provided by our generous ladies who also devote time and care to us, and made generous donations which serve to support our church and to keep our musical instruments in good order.

Interestingly, the pianist who played the preliminary music for next day's wedding in the church was thrilled to find a superbly tuned and responsive Bechstein piano at his finger tips. Thanks again to Charles.



#### BY A RELATIVE NEWCOMER TO GRANGE

The next mid-week concert is on **Thursday 1st September at 11 am** and will be given by Ian Thompson. Ian has recently retired from a busy and varied career as a professional musician and has come to live in Grange-over-Sands. He was an Organ Scholar at Queen's College Cambridge, and later became a Vicar-Choral at St Paul's Cathedral (singing at the Queen's Silver Jubilee).

Ian then became an opera and oratorio singer, performing at Covent Garden, La Scala Milan, and opera houses in Paris, Lyon and Los Angeles. Since retiring he has taken up the euphonium and he counts himself as "spare" organist at St Paul's Church.

His programme of organ music on the recently restored organ in St Paul's Church is varied and interesting and will include Bach's popular *Toccata and Fugue in D minor* as well as *A Birthday Suite for Her Majesty*, written by Cartmel Priory's organist, Adrian Self. He will also perform Messiaen's *Le Banquet Celeste*.

Dear John

#### Thank you for your 2021 Parish Offer

"I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now" *Philippians 1: 3-5* 

As I write to thank you for your generosity in the 2021 Parish Offer, Paul's words to the Philippians resonate with me. I am tremendously grateful to God for each of our parishes that make up Carlisle Diocese, for every person who worships within our churches and for your sacrificial generosity which enables such a significant amount of money to be given towards ministry.

Collectively, you gave over  $\pounds 4$  million in Parish Offer to support not only the mission and ministry in your own parishes, but also mission and ministry in other parishes across the Diocese. This giving is a living example of the type of "partnership in the gospel" in which Paul was taking such joy, all those years ago.

As I reflect on 2021, I see this "partnership in the gospel" in action time and time again; in your financial giving through Parish Offer, and in many other ways, as we work together to see God's Kingdom come in every community in Cumbria. For example, the 2021 Parish Offer funded 75 stipendiary priests, 6 house-for-duty priests, 10 curates and 8 Network Youth Workers. We are equally indebted to countless gifted laity and retired clergy who faithfully serve our churches and communities.

Through all these ministers (lay and ordained), many thousands of adults, young people and children have: encountered the living God through worship; found comfort and support in dark moments of life such as bereavement; been encouraged into a closer walk with Jesus; heard the good news for the first time; celebrated in the joy of weddings and baptisms; found practical support in times of hardship (e.g. through foodbanks or Christian Against Poverty); connected with children and families through schools work, Network Youth Church and messy church; and found deep fellowship with one another - to name just a few examples! All this happened in the context of a global pandemic and continued restrictions to our lives and meeting together.

As we journey through 2022 and beyond, I implore each of us to unite once again around our four vision themes: follow daily, care deeply, tread gently and speak boldly. As church we continue to face many challenges as we live with the legacy of the pandemic and are now in a time of global and financial uncertainty. In times of challenge, the call to "partner in the gospel" is more pertinent than ever, as we recognise our profound need for one another. Partnerships are hard. They will undoubtedly require grace, the ability to apologise, the ability to forgive one another and the ability to show great generosity in spirit towards each other. I am confident that with Christ's help, we can achieve this.

And finally, a special thanks to you, our treasurers. I am particularly thankful for your faithful service to the life of your church. Your hard work and expertise are paramount to the running of our churches.

Around the same time, our Churchwarden received this email.

#### Hi Mike

I'm just following up on our meetings earlier this year, and I wanted to check in and see how you and the church were getting on in your deliberations about a stewardship programme. At the moment, as we do the rounds, Sophie and I keep getting challenged as to whether we think it is the right time to be "doing stewardship" given the current crisis. The Church of England's National Head of Stewardship, Jonathan de Bernhardt Wood, recently said, "I wouldn't encourage any church to delay for a couple of reasons. Firstly, the cost of living / high inflation / Ukraine/energy costs are going to be this way for some time. And secondly they make the church's ministry more expensive too, so the giving gap just grows bigger in the time it is delayed. It is, though, even more important to be sensitive to the financial pressures that may exist, acknowledging that some may have to give less as a result of these challenges, which also serves as an encouragement to those who are not as affected to give more."

We have updated some of the Giving in Grace literature to include the questions raised by the Crisis and we have even added a special section on the <u>Diocesan website</u>. You might find this useful.

I wonder if you could let me know where you are all up to. Is there anything more that Sophie and I could do at the moment? Could we attend a PCC, or help with pulling together a Generosity Week campaign?

It would be good to hear from you if you could spare a minute or two.

The PCC reduced our Parish Offer last year because of the length of time without regular clergy support from the Diocese. As this situation remains unresolved, and after much deliberation, the PCC have concluded that, as very little has changed since last year, our offer for this year will remain at  $\pounds$ ,20,000, with an additional 10% to cover the cost of inflation, thus making a Parish Offer for 2023 of  $\pounds$ ,22,000. Once the situation within the Team has been resolved, we shall consider an increase. We do not think that the time is appropriate for us to consider any stewardship campaign.

#### The LAMBETH CONFRENCE

The Bishop of Carlisle has today (26th July) joined fellow bishops from across the Anglican Communion at the Lambeth Conference being held in Canterbury.

It is the 15th such conference and sees Bishop James join over 600 bishops to discuss church and world affairs and the



global mission of the Anglican Communion for the decade ahead. People are encouraged to pray for the conference.

Its theme is 'God's Church for God's World - walking, listening and witnessing together, with the conference exploring what it means for the Anglican Communion to be responsive to the needs of a 21st Century world. Topics under discussion include Mission and Evangelism, Safe Church, Anglican Identity, Human Dignity, The Environment and Sustainable Development, Christian Unity, Inter Faith Relations, Discipleship, and Science and Faith.

It takes place about every 10 years and this time runs from 26th July through to the official conference end on 7th August.



The Summer edition of the Diocesan paper *The Way* is now available on the God for All web site There are features on the new Bishop of Penrith's consecration, a Cumbrian curate who has just been appointed the first northern Eco Church officer, and a Ukrainian refugee and her family who have found help and support in a north Cumbrian village, plus lots more content.

**God for All** is the ecumenical vision for our county - four partner denominations and other companion churches are working towards that bold aim.



God for All builds on the prayers, planning and work across

churches in Cumbria over the past five years, emphasising mission at the heart of what we do. As part of the vision, new strategies for future ministry, outreach and buildings have been developed.

# Central to our vision are four emerging key themes: follow daily, care deeply, speak boldly, tread gently.

There are 35 mission communities across the county, dozens of fresh expressions of church are growing, and new and exciting ways are being realised to empower every-one's missional gifts.

#### CHURCHES TARGETED IN BANK SCAMS

Please be aware that nationally churches appear to be the subject of scammers. A typical scam may start with a phone call - allegedly from a bank's security team - which includes convincing detail about the parish, suggesting there are suspicious transactions about to go out from the PCC account – and attempting to obtain enough details to allow them to actually make some fraudulent payments.

Please make sure that those people with access to church bank accounts are aware that **passwords and login codes must never be disclosed on the phone**. If a call of this nature is received from your bank, end the call and phone your bank using a number you trust, and from a different phone – as they may still be holding on the line from the previous call. If the call was genuine, they will not mind you taking this approach, and if it was not, it may save you losing money.

Be cautious as well of 'follow up' calls after the event – as they may be trying a second attempt while pertaining to be helping with the initial scam. 

#### A LETTER TO ST PAUL'S CHURCH CONGREGATION

We have been very touched by the thoughts and kind wishes from so many who have prayed for Linda, me and the family after my heart attack, and I would like to convey my heartfelt thanks to you all but to also to give you an update.

On the 7<sup>th</sup> of August 2021 at 5.30 am I (Paul, Linda's husband) had a major heart attack, an event that came along very unexpectedly. I was fairly fit and healthy having quite a physical job and enjoying fell walking, and playing with my 2 grandsons, Jacob and Jack. They are always up for the thrill of being chased, or for the fun and laughter of me running with them in a wheelbarrow, hearing them shouting, "again, again, Granddad."

With Linda and our children, Emma and Matthew, we've always enjoyed being active and out and about and, up until my early 30's, I played club rugby and thrived on the training that came with it. So, one can imagine the shock of a major heart attack, and the uncertainty and emotions as we tried to process the situation, while the family watched me being airlifted to Blackpool hospital. Many people have experienced the trauma of similar circumstances and sadly for some a heart attack has been fatal. I thank God this was not the case for me.

It took one and a half hours before the ambulance arrived but during this time Linda and I prayed and at no point did I ever fear death or dying. After all, the Holy Spirit is the Spirit of peace, and Linda at my side was a great support. Prayer is not about me getting God to do what I want; prayer is asking God to do what He wants. The dynamics of that are shrouded somewhat in mystery, but the reality of prayer is beyond doubt.

At Blackpool after the angiogram located a 50% blocked artery the cardiologist inserted a stent in my right arm and into my left coronary artery which successfully stopped the attack. In December 2021 at WGH a heart stress test confirmed why I was experiencing breathlessness, chest discomfort (angina) and muscle fatigue, particularly in the legs. The left ventricle, which oxygenates and pumps the blood, is only operating at 35%, and this is classed as heart failure but there is also heart disease, with 2 other 50% blockages, one just below the aorta (main artery) and one in the central coronary artery, and some concern about the right coronary artery. In May after seeing a cardiac surgeon at Lancaster hospital it was decided I needed a bypass, possibly in December 2022 but there is no date yet.

Proverbs 12:4 says "a wife of noble character is her husband's crown" and without doubt my crown shines bright. Linda and I have shared our concerns about the future and my health and I've needed to reduce my workload from a full-on 6 days a week to 2 or 3 days. The reduced heart function and its effects mean it is essential to rest and recuperate.

I'm prayerful and conscious of walking with the Lord – we need His presence and His assurance. For 20 years I've been involved in prayer ministry, teaching and training in healing and discipleship. God has brought me physical healing, and I hope has enabled me to bring healing and peace to others. I have faith in God to heal. However, I'm also reminded that this world is only temporal and that our focus should be on eternity, God's sovereignty, Christ Jesus, and His return. God bless. Paul Brown



# A LURID TRUE STORY OF CRUELTY AND SLAVERY ON THE SHELVES OF ST PAUL'S

It was necessary to move the large wooden bookshelf at the back of St Paul's before we recently had the floor repolished so we took the opportunity to review the books we were holding and to refresh the balance of those remaining. One work that caught my eye was a paperback by Giles Milton entitled *White Gold*.

This tells of the enslavement at sea in 1716 of an 11-year old Cornish cabin boy and 51 of his comrades by Barbary corsairs and of the subsequent events, including the 23 years of captivity suffered by Thomas Pellow and his eventual return to



Cornwall. It is not pleasant reading and one blanches at the gratuitous loss of life and incredible suffering inflicted on those unfortunate enough to go into slavery.

It is a period and area of history which has received little attention over the years. The British government, beset by other and more pressing problems, paid little attention to this and other problems on the Mediterranean-Atlantic sea routes, and Wikipedia does not provide much auxiliary information. Meknes, where much of the action takes place, is now a small market town in the interior of Morocco, rarely visited by tourists and the appalling slave pens seem to have largely been left to deteriorate into grain and wine warehouses. The names of the Berber villains are unknown except to specialist historians of which there are few.

But the story is there, on our shelves, and

available to those who wish to read an appalling true story. I just wonder how it came to be on our shelves and who gave it to us. It is not for those of a weak disposition

#### LAMMAS DAY-1ST AUGUST

Lammas Day, also known as Loaf Mass Day, is a Christian holiday celebrated in England, Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland and other countries in the northern hemisphere on 1st August or on the nearest Sunday, and on February 1st in the southern hemisphere. While some Christian communities may still practise a 'blessing of he loaves' on Lammas, it is a tradition that is beginning to die out. Nowadays, most Christians who want to celebrate Lammas do so by adorning their house in symbols such as corn husks, wheat strands, apples and other traditional harvest symbols.

Traditionally, Lammas bread is baked and brought into the church for a blessing. The loaf is broken into four pieces with each of the pieces

placed at the corner of a barn to protect the newly harvested grain.

Lammas bread is often made in shapes including wheat, owls, plaited or made into a wreath. Other symbols include corn dollies, twigs bundled together, sprigs of mint and, of course, involves family and friends enjoying each others' company with large feasts. It marks the first harvest of the season and is different from 'Harvest Festival', which celebrates the end of the harvest season in September.



The name originates from the word "loaf" in reference to bread and "mass" referring to the Christian liturgy celebrating Holy Communion.



Lammas is the conventional name of the Quarter Day which falls on August 1st. The other quarter days are Candlemas (2nd February), May Day (1st May) and All Saints Day (1st November) denoting the quarters of the calendar.

#### An interesting fact gleaned from Facebook
