#### FROM THE VICARAGE

Advent and Christmas are the season for hope. But how can we experience hope in the midst of multiple crises: another conflict in Europe, another rise in unemployment, another grim set of economic forecasts, and rising costs where some are having to make choices about whether to put on their heating or feed their children. It can feel as though hope is in sort supply. We seem to roll from one crisis to the next barely catching our breath between each one. The chances of finding any sources of hope seem slim and often beyond our grasp.

The season of Advent and the approach to Christmas, however, are a powerful reminder that, contrary to appearances, hope shimmers all around us. It just doesn't look like we expect it to look. On one level this shouldn't surprise us. Jesus, the hope for all the world, certainly didn't look like the peoples of his day expected him to look. The Jews of the first century had all their hopes pinned on a different kind of king, powerful and majestic. What they got instead was a baby. They expected him to live in a palace, instead he was found where animals eat. The light that shone so vividly in the darkness was nothing like anyone had thought that it would be.

If we listen to the news and find ourselves disheartened by all that is going on around us, it's worth reminding ourselves again and again that hope has always appeared among us at unexpected times and in unexpected form. The Jesus whose birth we prepare to celebrate brings the kind of hope we can neither imagine nor anticipate.

The theme of hope is something I've been thinking about a lot recently and if you're interested, Revd Jane Maycock and I are going to explore the theme a little more fully in the New Year: three sessions that invite us to consider that Christianity is about real hope, a joyful expectation for the future, based on true events in the past, which changes everything about the way we experience the present.

So if hope feels hard to come by or you feel like refreshing your faith in the New Year, please consider joining us. Following the three sessions there will be an opportunity for anyone wishing to be confirmed to continue with a further two evenings of preparation. We will meet in the Church Room at St John's, Flookburgh, at 3.30 pm on the third Sunday in the month. The first two sessions will be on 15<sup>th</sup> January and 19<sup>th</sup> February (the third date will be confirmed in

#### THE CIVIC REMEMBRANCE SERVICE Sunday, 13th November 2022

St Paul's was filled to capacity as the community came together to commemorate all the lives lost in "world wars and conflicts past present ... in the cause of justice, freedom and peace" – words taken from the bidding prayer. The service was led by the Revd Jonathan Brewster and Bishop Nigel McCulloch, with contributions from Deacon Joe Pryslucki representing the Roman Catholics, the Revd David Edmondson the Methodists, and the Revd Martin Coe the United Reformed Church. HM King Charles was represented by Mrs Suzie Bagot, Deputy Lieutenant, and Mrs Tricia Thomas represented the town of Grange-over-Sands, along with several of the councillors. Jonathan Brook, the Leader of the Westmorland and Furness Council, was present to represent MP Tim Farron.

Scout George Evans carried the Union Flag, and Martin Wright the Standard of the Royal British Legion, and they were followed by the banners and colours of the Guides, Brownies, Scouts and Cubs, and the special banner made by pupils from Grange Primary School. Next came the presentation of wreaths, representing the uniformed services and the voluntary and service organisations in the community. As organist Charles Edmondson played 'Nimrod', Carol Rhodes carried up to the altar the battlefield cross which once stood above the grave of Hubert Podmore, a soldier from Grange who was killed in the First World War. Readings were given by Phillipa Summers (Headteacher at the Primary School), Brian McCann (Churchwarden) and Pippa Eccles (Chair of Governors), and the choir from the school sang 'Let there be peace on earth'.

After the service, members of Flookburgh Silver Band led the procession down through the town to the War Memorial in the Ornamental Gardens, where about 200 people gathered for the short service with the Last Post, 2 minutes' silence and Reveille, and the words of the Kohima read by Rosie Eccles. The final act was the laying of 26 wreaths. Most poignant was the final wreath which was laid by a Ukrainian family.

The procession then reassembled to walk back up the hill to the Victoria Hall for refreshments.

The service booklet this year was devised by Bishop Nigel. As the retired Bishop of Manchester and the former National Chaplain to the Royal British Legion who led the

worship at the Festival of Remembrance in the Albert Hall for many years, we are very fortunate and grateful to have the benefit of his knowledge and advice. This booklet will now be used each year. The artwork on the front and back cover resulted from a competition at Grange Primary School, and the winners were Alice Evans (year 6) and Molly Nicholl (year 3). Bishop Nigel visited the school to present their certificates.

#### .How we came to Grange - No. 4

I retired in 1999, and Bill semi-retired in the same year. At that time we had no plans to move from our home in Belthorn, a small village in east Lancashire.

In 2005 and nearing the age of 60, Bill was finding it more difficult to reduce his work load. He was selfemployed as a heating and plumbing engineer and had



had a solid and loyal customer base for many years. Knowing Bill, he would never ignore a plea from a customer who had a burst water pipe or a faulty boiler. It was then we decided that if we wanted any peace we would have to move.

In September 2005 I met a previous work colleague for a coffee; he and his wife had bought a holiday lodge in Nether Kellet. They loved it and invited Bill and myself for a visit - perhaps it may be an option for our retirement.

One Monday morning the following week we decided to go and see for ourselves if this could be something for us to consider. However, travelling up the M6 and after much discussion, we decided it wasn't what we wanted; we needed a permanent move. We continued on the M6 intending to visit some friends in Ulverston, and whilst on the A590 and seeing the sign for Grange-over-Sands we decided to stop for a coffee.

It was a beautiful autumn day. We walked along the prom admiring the views of the bay and the fells, and it was then we knew that Grange would be ideal for us. It had good transport links, was only an hour from family and friends, had a new swimming pool (I was a member of my local swimming club). In fact everything we needed and wanted. We walked back into town and visited one of the estate agents, expressing a wish for a detached bungalow within walking distance to town and a church; we were informed nothing was available at that time. We were then advised to have a drive around to familiarize ourselves with the area.

Whilst driving along Ashmount Road I caught sight of a "For Sale" sign on Fellside Court, so we turned around and went to look. It was just what we wanted. Returning to the estate agents I mentioned this property, only to be told that it had been taken off the market, because the elderly vendors had decided to wait until the following spring. We left our contact details, had our lunch in Grange, and returned home.

Arriving home we found a message on our answer phone from the estate agent. They had been in touch with the vendors of Fellside Court. If we wished we could view their bungalow.

So, 9 am the following morning we departed for Grange. On viewing the bungalow we knew it was perfect for us. It was in need of updating but this wasn't a problem as Bill could do all the heating and plumbing and, hopefully, his joiner and electrician friends would be willing to help. We called in at the estate agents and made an offer. After a coffee in town we returned to the estate agents to be told that our offer had been accepted.

From 9 am the previous day, having departed Belthorn to see a lodge site in Nether Kellet, to 2 pm the following day we had bought a bungalow in Grange-over Sands!

At that time our family and friends were unaware of our intentions to move from Belthorn, so it was quite a revelation when we said to them "By the way, we went to Grange-over-Sands yesterday and bought a bungalow" (their comments not suitable for a parish magazine!).

We received the keys to Fellside Court eight weeks later at the beginning of December and over the following six months, with the help of Bill's colleagues, we finished most of the refurbishment. We moved in July 2006, one week after Bill's 60<sup>th</sup> birthday. Sadly I never did get to swim in Berners Pool - it closed just weeks before our move.

Wednesday of each month, served from 12 noon until 1.30 pm. Both events provide hot food and are free!

**St Anne's, Haverthwaite,** offers their **lunch club** on the second Wednesday of each month. Contact sarahbrew@btinternet.com to book a place.

The Revd David Edmondson (Chair of CTiG) writes: "This is part of the nationwide "**Warm Spaces**" initiative, encouraging community groups to open buildings and heat them for people



who have difficulty keeping their own homes comfortably warm all day. Our churches are ideal venues for this, and enable us to show God's care for people.

We are encouraging other churches to join in with this, so that we cover as much of the week as possible without having two churches close to each other open at the same time.

Grateful thanks to the Sisters of Boarbank Hall for hosting the annual Carol Service on Sunday, 27th November. It was good to be together once again post-Covid to celebrate the beginning of Advent. The collection amounted to  $\pounds$ 195 for the Barrow Foodbank.

#### TWO SPECIAL EVENTS BY CANDLELIGHT

First of all, our Festival of Carols and Readings is on Sunday, 18th December, at 4 pm. Charles will be the organist, and Ian will be conducting the choir of 26 voices. Always a lovely event, followed by mulled wine and mince pies.

The second is a social event on Thursday, 5th January, at 3 pm, neither a concert nor an act of worship (see page 23). It has been compiled by Audrey Gorman who has selected readings for the autumn and winter Festivals and included some wellknown passages, as well as other lesser known ones mostly of a secular nature and therefore not usually included in carol services. Charles will be providing some organ and piano pieces written for these special occasions between the readings. This event marks the end of the Christmas Festival, and will be about an hour in length. Again, afterwards mince pies and coffee will be served.

Why not bring along all your remaining mince pies for us all to enjoy, before finally waving goodbye to Christmas for another year?

We look forward to seeing you at either or both of these events.

#### STAMPS

Just a gentle reminder that we are still collecting used stamps in church. Now that the busy time is coming for the receipt of Christmas cards, don't forget that used stamps have a value – and this is another opportunity for recycling! The stamps will be sent off to the Royal National Institute for the Blind, who



recycle them into much-needed funds for their services to blind and partially sighted people.

Fundraising from donations of stamps has been invaluable for many charities over the past few decades. By working with Xchange Master, the RNIB is able to accept and convert postage stamp donations into usable funds. All stamps are accepted: new or used, 1st or 2nd class, foreign, first-day covers, presentation packs or albums. Stamps are sold by weight and they raise  $\pounds 20$  per kilogramme of stamps, so it's an easy way to raise money. The majority of donations are sorted into countries and sold to collectors for philatelic use. A small portion is also sold on to artists who make huge canvas pictures using different coloured stamps as pixels. Many of these works can be worth a lot of money but require the use of thousands of stamps to make the picture in the first place. A tiny fraction is also sold on to foreign buyers as GB stamps are still by far the most desirable as we were the first to produce stamps.

#### LET'S WRAP THINGS UP

The festive season is looming fast and it's not only gifts we need to purchase but the material in which they are wrapped. The use of wrapping paper is first documented in ancient China, where paper was invented in the second century BC.



In the past, gift wrapping has been shown to

influence the recipient who is more likely to rate their gift positively if it has traditional gift wrapping. More recently, researchers have found that gift recipients will have higher expectations of the gift inside based on the neatness of the gift-wrapping.

To make things more complicated, the way a gift is given and the symbolism of wrapping colours vary from country to country. According to Wikipedia:

- \* In Asia: avoid white, black and blue gift wrap colours associated with mourning
- \* In India: yellow paper is cheerful and appropriate for celebratory gifts
- \* In China: gifts covered in black writing are used exclusively for gifts to the dead but red wrapping denotes luck
- \* In South America: black and purple are associated with death and religious ceremonies
- \* In Italy: purple is considered unlucky

So, beware when you travel or give to someone from another culture. The wrong wrapping could send the wrong message.

However, in the UK, once the festivities are all over, we discard an estimated 227,000 miles of wrapping paper each Christmas. Not only is that bad for the environment but it also costs a hefty sum to dispose of festive waste. So what can we do to be more eco-friendly and still maintain a fun atmosphere with all the expectation that receiving a gift involves? Firstly, choose the wrapping materials wisely. Not any old bit of wrapping paper can be recycled. Those decorated with foil and glitter, are heavily dyed, laminated or covered in plastic sticky tape will land up in landfill, something that needs to be avoided. "Recycle Now" recommends using the "scrunch test": if paper is scrunched into a ball and stays like that, then it's good for the recycle bin. If it bounces back then it is not. Sticky tape, tags and decorations generally can't be recycled so think about using string, a folding method that requires less tape, wrapping in fabric, or using a bag or box that can be used again.

Now that's all wrapped up, etiquette experts from around the world agree that gifts should always be wrapped. It's up to us how we do it. Let's be creative. I recommend YouTube for ingenious techniques on concealing our gifts that will impress the recipient as much as the gift inside.

# FROM THE CROWN HOTEL TO CROWN HILL

The first hotel to appear in Grange was the Crown Hotel. Built in 1789, it had a prime position at the top of the main street - "Situated on an eminence near the sea, facing Morecambe Bay, and commanding charming views of scenery unsurpassed in the north" (from 1926 Red Book). For many years the Crown was the



major hotel; another was the Bay Horse Inn, later renamed the Commercial and then the Commodore, and, after the railway came to Grange in 1857, the larger hotels were built. At the end of the 19th Century, the Crown was owned by Thomas Westwood but, after his death, it was bought by the Yates family of the Castle Brewery Company at Ardwick, Manchester, who let it to John Coward. He was followed in about 1903 by John Borwick, and the hotel became Borwick's Crown Hotel.

In the early hours of Monday, 12th October 1908, a devastating fire destroyed most of the original building. The Westmorland Gazette's report of the fire tells us that the internal structure had low, beamed ceilings, and 'curious staircases' mainly made of wood. The fire was started when a ventilation flue for the gas lighting overheated and set on fire an oak beam in the ceiling of what was known as the travellers' room, situated on the left of the main entrance.

The Gazette reported that "the Head Boots, Thomas Kendall, was roused by a suffocating volume of smoke in his attic room at about 2 am. He partially dressed and roused the other 13 residents from their beds, all of whom escaped in their night clothes. Thomas ran to the fire station to raise the alarm and the brigade captain, the Revd G Vickars-Gaskell, and the vice-captain were quickly on the spot. The crew, helped by Grange volunteers, worked on the blaze for four hours. Two-thirds of the roof collapsed and the whole of the upper portion of the building was destroyed, the bedroom furniture and personal belongings of the family being burnt. They did save



the hotel silver! Damage to the building was estimated at  $\pounds$ 900 and  $\pounds$ 400 for the furniture, and the surrounding streets were strewn with feathers from the ruined mattresses."

Rebuilding started immediately, and an advert in Bulmer's History of Furness and Cartmel of 1910 boasted that the hotel was enlarged with roof garden, lounge hall, bowling green and good stabling.



I came across a 'Tariff and Souvenir' for the hotel, dated 1923 - which sparked the idea for this article! The following are direct quotes from it.

This old-established hotel which has been recently enlarged and rebuilt, enjoys a unique situation on the top of Church Hill, commanding a wide and lovely panorama of the Westmorland and Yorkshire hills as well as the bay itself, and offers every accommodation for Visitors, Tourists, Families, etc. Golf links near. Tennis court, Bowling green, etc.

#### **GRANGE-OVER-SANDS**

There is a widespread idea that Grange is only a winter or early spring resort, and that in summer it is overwhelmingly hot and enervating; but this is very erroneous, as in the warmest weather there is always a refreshing breeze blowing gently in from the open expanse of the estuary, and its ozonic properties are far from relaxing. It has been said by a high medical authority that 'the blending of mountain air with air strongly saline is most healthful and life-giving'. Grange certainly can offer liberally to its visitors this recuperative tonic provided by Nature, for the breezes, which come long miles over the sands encrusted with salt under the evaporation caused by a hot sun, are distinctly invigorating, whilst those which come over Hampsfell are direct from the heart of Lakeland, and fresh from the Cumberland and Westmorland fells.

The hotel was eventually taken over by Thwaites Brewery, with a series of landlords or tenants. It was always a popular meeting place for the locals, a real community hub. Most evenings you could find a group of local men enjoying a pint over a game of dominoes – 5s and 3s was most popular! There was a function room on the right-hand side (where Margaret Grundy and Lilian Morris had their flats), where dances and private parties were held, and a cocktail bar at the front left-hand side. Produce for the dining rooms was grown over the road (where Sylvia Geraint now lives), and at the rear of the hotel (now Strand Court) were the putting green, a bowling green and a small beer garden. The crown bowling green was home to Grange Bowling Club, and Don Preston still recalls the many 'friendly' matches (ie not league) that were played here. There were also said to be tennis courts belonging to the hotel, but I am not sure where they were – I don't remember any!

The hotel was in business until 1990, when it was sold for housing. All except the front façade was demolished and rebuilt as the desirable Crown Hill private apartments (home

of Maureen Chadwick). Have you noticed how the name was retained on the façade – the H of hotel being moved to replace the O, and the T and E modified to an I and an L!
