
#### FROM THE VICARAGE

For many people Easter wouldn't be Easter without a chocolate egg. But did you know that we nearly missed out on chocolate? When Christopher Columbus brought cocoa beans back from the New World, nobody knew what to do with them. They didn't look very exciting, and they were discarded as useless.

Years later, the Spanish explorer, Cortes, tasted chocolate as a drink at the Aztec court of Montezuma and managed to get hold of the secret recipe. For over a century, Spanish monasteries had a chocolate monopoly, processing cocoa beans as a drink. Even when the secret leaked out, manufacturing problems had to be overcome before anyone developed chocolate to eat, rather than drink. But soon the obstacles were cleared as people with names like Cadbury believed in the product and its mass production.

At Easter especially it's somehow appropriate that those unlikely-looking cocoa beans should have a new life, transformed into something as wonderful as chocolate! Unlikely as it seemed, those ugly cocoa beans that some wanted to throw away held the secret of chocolate. It took people with faith in its potential to turn it into the global product it is today. Much more significantly, the man executed as a criminal on Good Friday held the secret of eternal life. That too seemed unlikely. That too needed people to have faith—people like Mary Magdalene, like the first disciples, like Christian men and women through the ages, like us.

Far more so that the manufacture of chocolate, the Church has always faced huge challenges, but will come through them because Easter is more than a chocolate feast. It's a resurrection feast, the most important festival in the Christian year. When we look at the cross we could see failure, but we don't, we see salvation. When we look at the challenges that face us we could lose hope, but we don't, we are reminded of the resurrection. At Easter we remember with joy the resurrection of Jesus, who died for the sins of the world and rose to bring us new life.





#### ANNUAL CHURCH PAROCHIAL MEETING

Early notice for our Annual Parochial Church Meeting, which will, in 2023, be held on Wednesday, 19th April, at 7.30 pm in St Paul's Church.

In 2023, we are required to elect two representatives to the Deanery Synod, for a term of three years. Currently, myself, Mike Hill and Nevil Newman have carried out this role for the past three years. Nevil wishes to stand down from the PCC now, after a good number of years of dedicated service, for which we thank him. I cannot stand for election this time, as all the meetings are on an evening that I have another engagement. #### BISHOP JAMES TO RETIRE

The Bishop of Carlisle has announced he is set to retire at the end of August after more than 20 years' senior leadership ministry in Cumbria. A special service of thanksgiving for his ministry is planned for Sunday 16 July at Carlisle Cathedral.

The Rt Rev James Newcome and his wife Alison first came to the county in 2002, following his appointment as the Suffragan Bishop of Penrith. Seven years later he was appointed the Diocesan bishop.

In his letter he writes: "Having served here as Bishop for the last 21 years I need hardly say how much I have come to love this beautiful county and its wonderful people. It has been an immense privilege to live and work in Cumbria, and while it would be a slight exaggeration to say that I have enjoyed every single minute of my ministry here (!) I can honestly report that these have been among the happiest and most fulfilling years of my life, for which I am profoundly grateful. I was astonished when God first called us to this Diocese: but am now so very glad that he did, and I have particularly valued his gracious provision of outstanding colleagues and so many kind and loyal friends."

#### VACANCY IN SEE

A bishop looks after a 'see', so when there is a vacancy in a bishop's post, it is called a Vacancy in See.

Our Vacancy in See Committee was first convened in March 2023 at the request of the Archbishops' Appointment Secretary to begin the process for discerning and appointing the next Bishop of Carlisle. The Committee is required to meet at least twice, but has chosen to hold at least four meetings between March and May 2023, with allowance for a further provisionl meeting if needed.

The Committee asks all members of our diocesan community to support this important task through prayer and reflection. The process includes a range of tasks and responsibilities at both a diocesan and national level.

The Committee has two tasks specified in the legislation:

- to prepare a Statement of Needs giving a brief overview of our diocese and a statement setting out the desired profile and qualities of our new Bishop.
- to elect six diocesan representatives to the Crown Nominations Commission to assist in the selection and interviewing of all potential candidates.

As one of the people involved in drafting the Statement of Needs, the Revd Jane Maycock wants to hear from as many people as possible. Archdeacon Vernon Ross and Revd Andrew Norman are part of the Consultation Group.

This diocesan work runs in tandem with a national consultation led by the Archbishops' Appointment Secretary and the Prime Minister's Appointment Secretary in May.

A new family has arrived in church—courtesy of Margaret Ratcliffe. A family of mice representing different aspects of our church life has appeared, and will be used during visits to St Paul's by the Primary School and other young people.



#### From the Archbishop of Canterbury

I'm so honoured and grateful that His Beatitude Patriarch Theophilos III and the Anglican Archbishop in Jerusalem have consecrated the Chrism oil that will be used to anoint The King at his Coronation in May.

I want to thank His Beatitude Patriarch Theophilos III for providing the Coronation Oil from the Mount of Olives - which reflects The King's personal family connection with the Holy Land and his great care for its peoples.

I'm also delighted that the Anglican Archbishop in Jerusalem, the Most Revd Hosam Naoum, shared in the consecration at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem.

Since beginning the planning for the Coronation, my desire has been for a new Coronation oil to be produced using olive oil from the Mount of Olives. This demonstrates the deep historic link between the Coronation, the Bible and the Holy Land.

It has been created using olives harvested from two groves on the Mount of Olives, at the Monastery of Mary Magdalene and the Monastery of the Ascension - near the burial place of the King's grandmother, Princess Alice of Greece.

The Chrism oil, which uses olives pressed just outside of Bethlehem, is perfumed with sesame, rose, jasmine, cinnamon, neroli, benzoin, amber and orange blossom - the same recipe used at the late Queen's Coronation.

From ancient kings and now to the present day, monarchs have been anointed with oil from this sacred place. As we prepare to anoint The King and The Queen Consort, I pray that they would be guided and strengthened by the Holy Spirit.



## KING CHARLES III CORONATION PRAYERS

The Coronation of King Charles III will take place on Saturday 6th May 2023 at Westminster Abbey, in a service steeped in centuries of tradition and rich in Christian symbols and values. To mark this important moment in our nation's life, the Church of England is calling for a period of prayer and has released a



book of Daily Prayers. Running from Easter Day for 28 days up to the Coronation, this booklet provides a daily theme, reading, reflection and prayer for use by individuals, churches or groups who wish to use these days to:

- \* pray for The King, our nation and the world
- \* explore the symbolism of the Coronation service
- \* reflect on Jesus, the Servant King.

It also includes prayers for The King and the Royal Family for use in years to come.

Churches and cathedrals around the country will be leading and joining local celebrations throughout the Coronation Weekend, and St Paul's will be holding an ecumenical service at 11 am on Sunday, 7th May.

Almighty God, we give you thanks for Charles your servant and our King, for his devotion to his family, nation and Commonwealth and to the Earth, our fragile home. We thank you for his faith in you and his love for all peoples and for his call to be our sovereign in such a time as this.

Bless and protect Charles in all the years to come, grant him long to reign over us and give him gifts of wisdom and discernment as together we face the opportunities and challenges of our age.

Bless Camilla the Queen Consort, William, Prince of Wales, and all the Royal Family in this time of mourning and of change.

May we all abide in your love, draw strength from the deep wells of Christian hope and dedicate ourselves afresh to God's kingdom of justice and peace.

#### HOW WE CAME TO GRANGE - No. 8

We have been in Grange, Kents Bank to be exact, for 43 years this year, almost but not quite locals. During this time we have lived in three different properties, each one specific to our stage in life.

How did we come to be here?

My parents were already living in Grange but going through a period of ill health. We found ourselves travelling the M6 from Southport most weekends. As well as this, our two girls were coming up to the time for changing schools from junior to secondary. So, we took the plunge and bought a guest house in Kents Bank. Our friends thought we were mad to leave good secure jobs to become self-employed and move into the unknown. I was a Home Economics Teacher at a Comprehensive School in Southport and Derek was a joiner.

We moved in on April 1st 1980 and it was snowing. To say that it was a culture shock was an understatement. It was so cold and so large to what we had been used to that we all slept in one room for a week to keep warm. We had a few days to get ready for the Easter bookings and then it was all go.

In 1980, Kents Bank was a thriving village. There were two Christian Holiday houses, numerous small guest houses, a Post Office and café, and a very good hotel which was also the local pub. There was a decent bus service and as now a railway station. Holiday-makers liked Kents Bank for these reasons and for the lovely walk, past Cedric Robinson's cottage, to the swimming pool, promenade and into the town itself. After Easter the girls started at Grange School and from then on never really looked back. They quickly joined Brownies; their leader in Southport had written to Joyce Rawlins in Grange and she made them very welcome. They went from Brownies to Guides to Rangers and then to become leaders themselves.

We soon became part of the community quickly making friends, joining Chamber of Trade and being involved with Grange Carnival and then The Edwardian Festival. There is one thing about Grange that is surprising to people that don't live here—there is always plenty to do if you take the time to join in.

Our 20 years in the guest house were very hard work, but we had a lot of fun and met some very nice people, many of whom would come back to see us each year .At that time the season was Easter to end of October. We would then close and get out the paint brushes. In between working Derek upgraded all rooms and maintained the property. When we look back we sometimes wonder how we found the time for everything.



Our church life was difficult at this time as the hospitality industry doesn't respect service times. As life got a bit easier we were able to take a fuller part in the life of St Paul's Church. I can honestly say that we have never regretted moving to Grange. Over time we have lost all our parents but have been blessed with a good family and four wonderful granddaughters. We have all benefitted from living in this wonderful part of the world and from being part of this community.

For many years Sandra was the leader of our flower team and masterminded a fantastic flower festival and various festivals in St Paul's, ably assisted by Derek who made some stunning artefacts to go with the displays — I remember particularly a free-standing wooden signpost made for 'Moving Mountains' and a miniature wooden cart for the Harvest Festival! Sandra was also a helper with the Edward Bear Club.

#### WORLD DAY OF PRAYER 3rd MARCH 2023

All those who attended this year's service at St Mary's, Allithwaite, were part of the huge wave of prayer which circled the earth for at least 38 hours. It began at dawn in Western Samoa and Tonga in the Pacific Ocean (when we would have been listening to the previous day's 6 o'clock news) and ended at dusk in American Samoa (when we were having breakfast the following day). How amazing to be part of something so huge! This is what makes the Day of Prayer so special.

Each year the service is written by the Christian women of a different country, and this year it was the turn of Taiwan, a country that has for many years been caught in a superpower struggle. It has been isolated internationally for decades and, as of April 2022, only 13 of the 193 United Nations Member States and Vatican City/Holy See have recognised Taiwan as a sovereign country.

China continues to claim Taiwan as its sovereign territory although a large majority of Taiwanese reject reunification with China, which has begun to harass Taiwan almost on a daily basis. According to Reuters, the risk of conflict is now at its highest level for decades. The people of Taiwan are very much in need of our prayers at this time.

This service was both thought-provoking and appropriate in our current climate. It included letters of encouragement for women who face suffering and injustice. These stories of faith focused on issues shared by women and girls around the world that continue to challenge us to prayerful action.

We thank the Christian women of Taiwan for this service, and St Mary's, Allithwaite, for hosting it and providing delicious refreshments. Next year's service will be prepared by Palestine, and the following year by the Cook Islands.

#### THE MILLENIUM PEACE PAVEMENT IN GRANGE

Because some people were unaware of the exact location of our peace pavement in Grange – some unfortunately turning up in the Sensory Garden for the Ukrainian vigil last month - I thought it might be of interest to explain the origins of this pavement.

The idea came after a visit to the Dane John gardens in Canterbury where we saw their European Peace Pavement, containing paving stones representing cities in Europe which suffered from devastating bombing raids in World War II, eg Dresden, Guernica, Coventry and Canterbury.

A dear friend, the late Pam Baines, an Elder in the United Reformed Church, was President of Churches Together at that time, and took up the idea of creating a similar pavement in Grange to mark the millennium. A site was chosen by the top path in the ornamental gardens, alongside the railway line and overlooking the War Memorial. Much care was taken in the choice of the words that should appear. The stone came from Burlington Slate at Kirkby-in-Furness and funding was obtained from Churches Together, Grange Town Council; Neighbourhood Forum and South Lakeland District Council, with folk in Grange invited to sponsor one of the letters in the wording chosen.


