FROM THE VICARAGE

At the end of this month several candidates from across our Anglican Churches on the Peninsula are going to be confirmed, including a member of St Paul's. The service is taking place at St John's Flookburgh at 10 am on Sunday 25th June, and all are welcome to join us on this special occasion.

In recent weeks some have asked me what confirmation means. Confirmation is a special church service in which a person confirms the promises that were made when they were baptised. It's the second part of a two-part process of Christian initiation, the first part being infant baptism or christening. But I'm already a Christian - isn't that enough? Certainly our love for God is vital but the New Testament encourages us to express our love in a public act of witness in the presence of the Church (Acts 2:38-41; Romans 10:9-10, 1 Timothy 6:12). Depending on your denomination this could be adult baptism, or adult baptism with confirmation, or just confirmation in the case of someone baptised as an infant.

The present Church of England practice - like many traditions in other churches has evolved down the centuries from the early church's practices, but the root principle is about a public declaration of faith. This public declaration can happen at any time in a person's life and it's never too late! The service is presided over by a Bishop, in our case Bishop James Newcome, who lays hands on each candidate, confirming or *sealing* their acceptance of Jesus Christ and praying for the Holy Spirit to be with them.

The laying on of hands by a Bishop is a powerful sign and action that has been part of the Christian practice for two thousand years (Acts 8:14-17). In the context of a confirmation service, the laying on of hands is used in two ways: to commission a person for a life of Christian service and a special prayer that a person might receive the Holy Spirit's strength and power to live the Christian life. This doesn't mean that a person did not previously receive the Spirit at their baptism. But at the confirmation service the Church's prayer is that the presence of the Spirit in their life should be confirmed and that they should be filled with that same Spirit of God. As we go on in our lives we need continually to be filled with the Spirit and this should be our prayer day by day.

I write this on Pentecost Sunday, when we remember the outpouring of God's Spirit on the early church. Let's pray for each other that we may have renewed confidence and compassion as we seek to live by the energy of the Holy Spirit.

The next step in the life of St Paul's and the Fell Churches

After 7 long years of uncertainty since the departure of the Revd Nick Ash, progress is being made, and to a tight timetable!

The Cartmel Peninsula Team Ministry is to be dissolved, and will be replaced by four new benefices.



Allithwaite and Flookburgh, with one full-time priest-in-charge (PiC) Grange and Field Broughton with Linda, with one full-time PiC Cartmel, with 0.5 PiC paid by the Diocese and 0.5 PiC paid by Cartmel PCC Leven Valley (Finsthwaite, Haverthwaite, Staveley), with 0.5 PiC

Each PCC has now been asked to prepare a 'profile' covering four aspects:

- Background general overall description of the parish
- The church history, condition, uses, etc
- The congregation age profile, types of service, what we are looking for, how we engage with the community, etc
- Worship usual pattern, how it might be changed

We have been given the proposed timetable for appointing the priests-in-charge to each of these benefices.

End of June – a complete draft parish profile End of July – parish profile agreed September – post advertised November – interviews

The whole process will involve consultation. We will be working closely with Field Broughton, and we are seeking your views on the gifts, qualities, skills and experience you would like to see in a new vicar. There is a file at the back of both St Paul's and the Fell Churches, and we would welcome your comments before the 17th June so that they can be incorporated into the profile that we are being asked to complete by the end of June.

We have been assured that our priest-in-charge will be based at the Rectory in Grange, and understand that the current tenants have received two months' notice to vacate so that work can begin on modifying the present building to bring it up to the required standard.

It is exciting to hear that at last progress is being made, and we can begin to move forward in the life of our church within a mission community that encompasses the whole of the Cartmel peninsula, including Anglicans, Methodists, the United Reformed Church, and friends in other companion denominations.

The Statement of Needs has been published on the Diocesan website, and you can also find details of the six people elected. They are:

They will join with national members of the CNC and the Archbishops to shortlist and interview candidates. Interviews will take place in December with an announcement about two months later. Given the various legal processes, it is likely that a new Bishop will only take up his/her responsibilities some months after that.

People have until Friday 9th June to submit any further comments about the needs of the Diocese or names of potential candidates that they may wish to nominate.

DIOCESAN GIVING PLATFORM

In the light of changes in the way we handle our finances these days, we have been exploring various ways of giving to Church. With fewer people actually carrying cash, the banks charging us to use cheques, and many of us now banking on-line, the 'times they are a-changing'! Many of us have now chosen to make annual or monthly on-line bank transfers for our regular giving, but what about the individuals, often visitors, who would like to make a one-off donation using their smart phones? The PCC has now decided that the simplest – and cheapest – method is to use the Diocesan Giving Portal with our own QR code which leads to an electronic form where names, addresses and card numbers can be entered. There is also an option to gift aid the donation. In making this decision, we are following most of the other churches in the peninsula.

HOW THE DIOCESAN GIVING PLATFORM WORKS

Pages have been set up by the Diocese, and any monies donated through these pages will go directly through to Carlisle Diocese. Where appropriate, gift aid is collected on our behalf, and on a quarterly basis the total value of donations plus gift aid is sent through to us. The QR code is now available for display in our pews, on pewsheets, orders of service, on the web site, etc, and a card of explanation will soon be appearing in each of the pews showing this code and how to use it with a mobile phone.

- 1. Open the camera app on the phone.
- 2. Point phone at the QR code.
- 3. Get the QR code in the viewfinder box. Wait a few seconds until a pop-up banner appears.
- 4. Tap pop-up banner or the QR icon which appears. You are then ready to go.

If the pop-up banner does not appear make sure that the QR code is wholly inside the viewfinder. If the banner still does not appear check that the QR reader is enabled on the phone. Go to the settings app and scroll down and tap camera. Make sure that the slider for scanning QR codes is in the right position. Then go to 4 as above.

On a Sunday last month St Paul's were privileged to host a visit by the musicians of Rossall School, Fleetwood, who gave us a stimulating lunchtime concert. What a pity that not more of our regular congregation were present to witness the talent displayed – and we learned after the event that the senior musicians of the group had not been allowed to make the trip as the proximity of serious examinations made further revision necessary.

However, those who made the visit gave us a most enjoyable and worthwhile presentation with a variety of skills displayed which ranged over a wide range of composers, from Bach to Anthony Newley. Our piano was well used and we also heard the cello and the clarinet, plus a wonderfully rendered Robert Schumann solo sung in German. All the soloists performed with confidence, enthusiasm and clarity, and it was a pleasure to receive and hear them. Our thanks go to Adam Dobson, the Teacher of Music, and his assistant, Georgia, for their work and skills and in giving up their Sunday to make the trip north.

Rossall has a rich musical tradition. The school has produced many eminent musicians, most notably the acclaimed conductor Sir Thomas Beecham – and the final piano soloist, a young Ukrainian with just a year in the UK to his name, has already been accepted for further studies at the Royal Northern College of Music. The school possesses 21 Steinway grand pianos and is home to an International Piano Academy.

Later, a larger number of musicians comprising the school chapel choir led Choral Evensong. The Revd Jonathan Brewster presided, with Charles Edmondson on the organ -a further wonderful experience for the benefice. Particular thanks go to



Richard Rhodes, former pupil at Rossall who later returned as Headmaster until his retirement. Richard is currently churchwarden at St Mary's, Staveley, and arranged the visit. Thanks also go to Jeremy Quartermain, Headmaster, for allowing the trip (and singing in the choir). We look forward to welcoming further visits for additional artistic experiences.

HOW I CAME TO GRANGE-OVER-SANDS - NO. 10

I came to live in Flookburgh (not quite Grange, but near enough) in July 1990 with my parents, who had always wanted to retire to the area. Their place of choice was Arnside, and they had intended to move about 10 years before, but things got delayed. When we arrived in the area to look for a new house, we started in Arnside, looked at the hill and the house prices (they didn't compare very favorably with house prices in Huddersfield and my parents were then 10 years older than when the move was first planned). We looked in Milnthorpe, Holme, and then came around the bay to Grange – had a look at another steep hill, and kept going to Kents Bank, and eventually Flookburgh, where we found 2 houses for sale. The first was a semi-detached house and we were wanting to down-size, so went to the second which had not yet been built, and having looking at the other houses that were already built on the development, my parents bought the bungalow that I still live in. We spent a day or two each month coming to look at progress, choose finishes, etc, and eventually agreed our moving in date.

I was working in Kirklees Metropolitan Council in Huddersfield, in the Building Control Department, and started to apply for jobs in the area. At my second interview at what was then the Nature Conservancy Council (NCC), I was offered the job of typist – a lower salary, but with the possibility of earning more if I passed the typing proficiency tests. At my interview the Chief Typist from the head office in Peterborough said at every sentence end, 'but your current job is not a typist' and try as I might to convince her that I could type, she wasn't buying it. However, when the typing test came, she'd really wound me up to the 'I'll show you whether I can type or not' stage! At the end of the test, she was very surprised that I had completed it and was two-thirds of the way through checking it. She later said that she had only had one other person who had managed that and said I should immediately put in for the advanced Civil Service typing test, which I passed, and thence managed to bring my salary up to the level I had left in Huddersfield. At that time NCC's office was at Blackwell, the Arts and Crafts house, in Bowness, now owned by Abbot Hall. I really enjoyed my time with NCC (who later became English Nature, then Natural England) until they offered voluntary retirement to all their administration staff, which is when I became Secretary/Personal Assistant to the Archdeacon of Westmorland and Furness.

My parents were both musicians, and we wanted to join a church choir when we arrived here. First we went to Cartmel Priory, thinking that would be the best choir, but that didn't work out; next we tried Flookburgh, who had their rehearsals at 5 pm on Thursdays – I was still at work in Bowness at that time. I worked with Pauline Bleasdale, who was in the church choir at St Paul's, Grange, and she invited myself and my mother to come to Grange and she would introduce us to Ann Waller, the choir mistress at the time.

We never looked back and I'm sure we picked the right church! My father was a Baptist and of course the nearest Baptist Chapel is in Tottlebank – too far without

his own car, so he went to the URC when we first moved here. Later, when we lost two good male members of the church choir at St Paul's we persuaded him to join us. My father was an organist and was still playing at funerals in his 90s! My mother was a singer, taught singing and also conducted several ladies' choirs, including The Ghyll Singers, Ulverston.

Strangely, when I was talking to Margaret Caseley when she was new at St Paul's, she heard I came from Huddersfield, and asked if I knew 'the Smiths'. It seemed a long shot, but when she started to describe the family, I realized we lived next door to them!

When I was young, we didn't have a car in the family and often caught the train to visit Grange-over-Sands, walking over to Cartmel and back. I never thought at that time that I would live here one day. I have never regretted the move – it is one of the best things that has ever happened in my life. Both my parents are now dead; however, they very much enjoyed the last years of their lives living in this beautiful area.

£2 BUS FARE CAP SCHEME

The \pounds 300 million Government-funded scheme has now been extended to 31st October 2023, and then until November 2024 at \pounds 2.50 a ticket.

At $\pounds 2$ for a single journey, you can now jump aboard a bus and see the country.

Available in England only, outside London, though journeys that start in England can cross borders into Scotland and Wales.

Payment can be made by cash on-board, by the Stagecoach bus app, contactless or Google/Apple pay.

Single tickets that currently cost less than $\pounds 2$ will remain the same.

In April, May and June a Stagecoach bus app customer chosen at random will be automatically entered into a 'give-away' to receive a year's free travel.

Let's jump aboard, save the planet and leave the negotiation of narrow country lanes and parking to the bus driver.

On a bright sunny day last month a 30-seater coach set off from Grange to visit the National Memorial Arboretum at Alrewas in Staffordshire. The trip had been organised by Grange Soroptimists to see their own memorial and also the new one dedicated to the Submariners Association, part of which had been designed by a young schoolgirl from Ulverston.

The Arboretum was the idea of Naval Commander David Childs CBE who had been inspired by a visit to Arlington Cemetery and

the National Arboretum in Washington, and believed that the UK should have a 'living' memorial to ensure we never forget the lives that have been lost - for whatever reason – 'A celebration of lives lived'.

Supported by Group Captain Leonard Cheshire VC, an appeal was launched in 1994 by the then Prime Minister, John Major. The project began with no money, no land, no staff and no trees. The National Lottery, in the form of the Millennium Commission, granted 40% of the funds needed and this was matched by thousands of donations from a wide variety of organisations both military and civilian, men and women, corporate and voluntary.



Redland Aggregates (now Tarmac) offered the 150 acre site on reclaimed gravel workings on a marsh plain between two rivers for a rent of \pounds 1 per year, and planting began in 1997. The Arboretum was created by a small army of volunteers and an original friends group with vital support and grants from the Forestry Commission and the National Forest Company. From the start it was seen as a place of joy where the lives of people would be remembered by living trees that would grow and mature in a world at peace. The Polar Bear Memorial was the first actual memorial to be unveiled at the Arboretum and was dedicated on 7 June 1998 as a tribute to the 49th West Riding Infantry Division, nicknamed 'polar bears' after their actions in icy Norway and Iceland.

In 2000 the millenium chapel of peace and forgiveness was dedicated, the only place in the country where an Act of Remembrance is observed every day. It features the Last Post, a Silence and the Reveille, and takes place at 11am. The altar and lectern



were made by young offenders from Swinfell Hall.

The Arboretum was officially opened to the public in May 2001 by HRH the Duchess of Kent, with the Armed Forces Memorial being dedicated six years later in 2007 as a national monument to those who have lost their lives on duty or as an act of terrorism since the Second World War. Now a registered charity, the Arboretum is part of the Royal British Legion, but a separate legal body, and ensures that:

- the unique contribution of those who have served and sacrificed is never forgotten
- the baton of Remembrance is passed on through the generations
- there is a year-round space to celebrate lives lived and commemorate lives lost.

It is not only the armed forces that are remembered. There are memorials to many service organisations, eg Rotary, Soroptimists, Scouts, but there is also a garden dedicated to



the Stillbirth and Neonatal Death Charity. Perhaps the most poignant is the 'Shot at Dawn' memorial.

The Arboretum currently holds 413 monuments and over 25,000 trees all set in beautiful parkland. Ten gardeners are employed but the rest of the work is done by volunteers. Our visit coincided with that of the Green Thumb judges, so the grounds



were immaculate! A further 25 acres have recently been given for a memorial walk around a lake to be dedicated to those who died during Covid.

Entry is free and there is a good restaurant and café, with plenty of parking – and dogs are welcome! Seats on a land train can be purchased and includes a 50minute ride around the site with commentary. Buggies are also available for those with mobility problems, and there are plenty of seats around the site. If you have not already visited, then a trip is warmly
