Dear Friends,

Have you noticed that we celebrate most of the festivals in the church's year, but Lent is very different. It's not a period we *celebrate*, just '*keep*'. Lent, the 40 days before Easter, not counting Sundays, began on February 14th. This year our Ash Wednesday service, marking the beginning of Lent, fell on Valentine's Day. Shops have been well stocked with cards, flowers, chocolates, persuading us to mark this day, remembering someone for whom we have special feelings. However, I doubt we would have found anything to remind us that, this year, the same day also marked the first day of Lent. Some churches and Christians treat Lent very seriously, whilst others, like the shops, ignore it completely.

I wonder what the 40 days of Lent mean to you? Perhaps these days give us a chance to revisit those New Year's resolutions we made and take them seriously to try and break some bad habits. Maybe we, like many Christians, give something up: chocolate, social media, alcohol, or responding immediately to emails. You see, there isn't any real agreement about how Lent should be kept.

So what is Lent about?

I was taught when I was small that it's about preparation - preparation for Easter, which I guess is what we all would have said. The 40 days of Lent give us plenty of time to reflect and ponder on the death and resurrection of Jesus, and perhaps appreciate Easter a little more as we take time to contemplate what it all means.

Perhaps it also provides us with an opportunity to practise resisting desires that would harm or hurt us. Trivial as this might seem, might a battle won over chocolate, wine or cake help us to win a battle over greed, lying or pride in the future?

Lent, taken seriously, can seem a very long six weeks. But Lent doesn't last. The darkness is broken by the glorious triumph of Easter Day.

Grey seems to have been the prevailing colour of the last few weeks. Dismal weather and not a lot of bright light. Perhaps our lives have been in 'Lent mode' too. Perhaps things haven't gone as we'd hoped, we don't get what we want, and joys seem to be thin on the ground. Yet, for us who are Christians, there is a wonderful and certain hope that however hard the darkness is in our lives, it will one day be lifted. Life's long Lent will end, as our earthly lives end and we journey into the amazing eternal Easter, where sin and death are destroyed for ever.

Whether or not, or how, Lent is kept is a matter of personal choice. I pray that, this year Lent for each of us will provide opportunities to be blessed and to bless others.



C NEWS FROM THE DIOCESE OF CARLISLE VACANCY IN SEE - LATEST The Diocese of Carlisle is currently in the process of seeking and appointing a new Bishop of Carlisle.

In December 2023, the Crown Nominations Commission (CNC) were unable to agree upon a nomination, meaning the CNC will meet again in 2025 to resume the process. It has now been confirmed that the CNC will meet in January 2025 to shortlist, with interviews scheduled for 13 and 14 March, 2025.

Please note that, though Vacancy in See committee elections are due to take place later this year, those elected will serve on a new committee should a future Vacancy in See arise. Members of the current committee will continue in post for as long as the See of Carlisle remains in Vacancy this time round. The exception to this is the Dean of Carlisle, the Very Rev Jonathan Brewster, who is an ex officio member of the committee and as such has taken his place following his installation in September 2023.

In the meantime, the Rt Rev Rob Saner-Haigh, Bishop of Penrith, will continue in the role as Acting Bishop of Carlisle.

Bishop Rob has provided an update on the discernment process, and in a filmed message he also outlines how the Diocese plans to move forward over the next 18 months, gives details about a capacity funding bid to the Church Commissioners, and calls on people across the county to continue to 'raise the spiritual temperature'.

A LENTEN MORNING RETREAT

On Saturday morning, 17th February, about 20 people gathered from across our churches for a 'quiet' morning in the Methodist Hall at the start of Lent. The Rev'd Sue Nicol led the session, taking as her theme 'Facing Change', and looking at verses 31-33 in the 8th chapter of St Mark's Gospel. She explained that it described a pivotal movement as Jesus predicted his death for the first time, a kind of watershed between the stories of his miracles and healings, and the start of his journey towards Jerusalem and the cross. It was a moment when Jesus, and his disciples, faced great change in their lives.



In our time of silence, Sue suggested we put ourselves in the place of one of the disciples, and pondered the following points.

- How do I think Jesus was able to face the change from ministry to suffering?
- What does the disciples' experience say to me about how I face change in my own life and faith?
- As the Church is facing change in all sorts of ways, how should I react to the challenge of these times?

The questions were particularly appropriate for those of us from St Paul's as we look forward to a new chapter in our church with the arrival of a new Vicar. How will we react to the changes that will inevitably come?

Hazel Edmondson shared what she had written down in response to Mark 8: 31-33, in particular the words "He made this very clear to them".

For all disciples	Clarity hard to bear
Anxiety levels rising	How could it come to this?
Challenging words to hear	All the hopes and dreams
Imagination running riot	Now crumbling in the dust,
yet	God within it all
No safe reassurances	Eternally
Good News?	

It was a very worthwhile morning which finished with a simple Communion service.

In a poem entitled, **'THE PEACE OF WILD THINGS'**, the American poet, cultural critic, environmental activist, and farmer, **Wendell Berry**, writes:

When despair for the world grows in me and I wake in the night at the least sound in fear of what my life and my children's lives may be, I go and lie down where the wood drake rests in his beauty on the water, and the great heron feeds. I come into the peace of wild things who do not tax their lives with forethought of grief.

I come into the presence of still water. And I feel above me the day-blind stars waiting with their light. For a time I rest in the grace of the world, and I am free.



HOW WE CAME TO GRANGE - No. 19

My journey to Grange starts in Eastbourne but I spent nearly all my childhood in Cornwall and Devon. I always say I am Devonian because from the age of 9 to 18 I had a fantastic range of experiences there. Those years were full of incredible interactions with numerous adults, experts in their various fields: so much so I have started writing about these brilliant people and what they taught me.

In 1960 I started a three-year teacher training course. I took a year out 1962/63 to work at the Department of Geodesy and Geophysics at Cambridge, most of the year being spent at sea on a Royal Navy survey ship. We collected data that supported the theory of continental drift.

In 1964 I started teaching at Northwich, Cheshire, and married a primary school teacher I had met at college. Our lives were very busy, not only with teaching and raising three children but I also decided to study for a degree at home. Despite never attending a lecture, I gained my honorary degree in geography and geology. By 1969, we had moved our family to Leek, north Staffordshire. My wife gained her first primary headship in Derbyshire, and I worked my way up to head of department. Then we moved to Wiltshire where I was deputy head at a large secondary school. Always liking a challenge, I accepted a headteacher position, working with several secondary schools and a further education college, to develop technological skills and vocational education.

Using that experience, I moved to Lancashire. My wife decided to remain in Wiltshire where she really enjoyed her headship. I was tasked with extending technology and vocational education across all Lancashire secondary schools and numerous special schools. Promotions eventually led to me being appointed as Chief Adviser, leading a team of nearly 200 advisors, advisory teachers and administrative staff, working to support all Lancashire secondary, primary and special schools.

By 1990 I was living at Goosnargh, near Preston. I met Pauline, who lived at Bolton where she was a medical secretary in thoracic medication at Bolton Royal Infirmary. We married in 1994. By 2000 we were living at Goosnargh and had both retired. Lancashire County Council identified Goosnargh as an area to be developed and housing developments started, sadly changing the rural character of the village. We decided we needed to move which was a great shame because we were enjoying being involved in so many groups. Pauline did a lot of work with the WI and helped at St Mary's Church. I helped raise funding to develop a children's play area, was chair of governors at the village primary school, and established a heritage group linked to St Mary's Church, as part of developing the ancient church to serve as a community hub.

So, where to live? Pauline's daughter Ann and her husband Wayne had moved to Lindale and established three businesses linked to tourism. Pauline and I travelled up and down the M6 on a regular basis to visit them.

We both enjoyed visiting Grange and the surrounding area, and it became clear this was where we wanted to live. I gave up some education consultancies work and stopped travelling all over the north of England and the Midlands, assessing teachers wishing to be identified as advanced skilled teachers.

Our bungalow at Goosnargh was sold and both of us were relieved to leave tending the large garden we had developed, with lawns to mow and lots of trees and shrubs requiring topiary. We moved to Grange and rented Fern Cottage, next to the Hazelmere. We loved the smell of baking, which started in the early hours, and greatly enjoyed looking out of the upstairs window at the park, with its lake, and watching the trains coming and going, with the Bay beyond. Pauline called it 'Toy Town'.

It took eight months to find somewhere to settle. We wanted a ground floor apartment, no garden, but somewhere to sit outside. After visiting lots of properties we were beginning to despair of finding somewhere suitable. One morning Wayne rang to say a bungalow had just come on the market and might be worth a look. We arranged a viewing that morning and by the end of the day we agreed a price and bought it.

We spent two years modernising the bungalow and re-designed the small gardens, back and front. In the meantime, Pauline joined the Bay Community Singers, having previously sung with the Lancashire WI Federation choir, often as their soloist, which performed at various cathedrals across the country. I now look after the U3A scrabble group. We started attending the beautiful Church of St Paul's and are extremely grateful for the warm and friendly welcome we have experienced.

A Rocha UK's **ECO CHURCH** scheme helps churches across denominations commit to practical environmental actions in all aspects of church life.



Many more churches are waking up to the need to

care for God's creation, providing community recycling services, taking action to reduce their carbon footprint, and creating a driving force behind change that we desperately need.

With over 6000 churches now registered, Eco Church is much more than a scheme. It is increasingly a community of churches and Christians responding to the environment crisis together, sharing tips and learning together.

The Diocese of Carlisle is currently encouraging all who manage its offices and places of worship to become "*eco-churches*" or "*eco-friendly buildings*". As mentioned in last month's article we have now registered St Paul's Church on the "Arocha" web site, and a small group has met to complete an Eco Survey about how we are caring for God's earth in five key areas of our church life:

- Worship and teaching
- Management of church buildings
- Management of church land
- Community and global engagement
- Lifestyle

Our answers have been entered on-line and will collect points towards an Eco Church Award – the more our church does, the more points we get!

How the award scheme works

There are three levels of Award – Bronze, Silver and Gold. In order to qualify you must attain the required standard in each of the areas covered by the Eco Survey. You can see when you have gained sufficient points in each category by looking at the coloured lines that appear on screen with the Eco Survey questions. The lines change colour as your points accumulate to reflect the level of Award you have achieved in that category. If all categories turn bronze, you have reached the standard to qualify for a Bronze Award, etc.

What next for us?

The late Pam Martin gave us a useful document entitled 'What churches/worship communities can do to become more environmentally friendly', and the group are now looking at these suggestions and picking out those which we feel we can usefully/easily implement. At our next meeting on the 12th April, we shall be discussing the next steps. If anyone would like to join us, they would be most welcome.

RECYCLING

One important consideration in becoming an Eco Church is to ascertain exactly what we as a church re-cycle or re-use. And furthermore......do members of the congregation actually have knowledge of this?

Some obvious things are the recycling of **paper** via the blue boxes which are put out every two weeks and importantly the compostable garden materials that goes in our two green bins. It is surprising how those who do the flowers in church so diligently, plus the few of us that tend the church grounds, produce so much '**green waste**'. This goes off to a depot in Kendal where it is transformed into a peat-free type of compost and then sold back to the gardening public.

We collect used **postage stamps** in a box at the rear of the church and these are sent to the Royal National Institute for the Blind.

Spectacles (used or obsolete in some manner) are also accumulated and sent off for re-use in poorer countries.

All **plastic and glass** from the church kitchen is taken away and put in our own domestic recycling packs for the fortnightly collection.

We also recycle used **batteries**, many of which come from either the church microphones or those left over from the Christmas Tree Festival, taking them to the household recycling plant at Risedale.

Light bulbs when they blow are replaced by new ones with the old ones also being recycled.

More recently, church members were asked to bring used **Christmas cards** for use in Pip's crafty-afternoons! A new innovation!

In the past we pride ourselves that some pieces of church **furniture** have been reshaped through carpentry to form things like the south wall cupboards (former pews), the shortened choir stall by the organ, and the steps at the lectern.

Old **candles** along with their stubs are collected and recycled by children at Grange School who regularly make new candles by melting down the wax into yoghurt carton moulds. A unique link perhaps, between any church and its partner CofE school?

Another aspect that should be mentioned is the disposal of the former choir **robes**, some of which went to Africa as sun protection garments and others to be re-used by the school as 'costumes' in their school nativity plays or other productions.

I suppose that we should also remember that we loan **jigsaws** and second-hand **books** through the new church lending library, which in themselves are forms of re use or re-cycling.

The group is engaging people in community projects, holding talks and exhibitions, and giving out information, eg the very successful Ecofair in the Victoria Hall. The PCC has decided to pay the £,5 annual subscription to this group.

And here is another opportunity to consider our life styles and choices!

An invitation to take part in the Big Plastic Count https://thebigplasticcount.com/

For one week, 11-17th March, we are invited by Greenpeace UK and the non-profit organisation Everyday Plastic to count each piece of plastic that we use in our homes, as evidence of the scale of plastic waste in the UK, and in order to convince UK ministers to lead the way at the global talks that could finally phase out plastic pollution for good.

The Big Plastic Count is the largest plastic investigation of its kind, and represents a once-in-a-generation opportunity for the public to influence the next round of negotiations for the UN Global Plastics Treaty set to be held in Ottawa, Canada, 23-29th April.

Almost a quarter of a million people participated in The Big Plastic Count in 2022, which revealed that:


- UK households throw nearly two billion pieces of plastic packaging away weekly
- just 12% is recycled in the UK, with the rest being burned, shipped abroad, or languished in landfills
- 83% of plastic recorded was from food and drink packaging waste, the most common item being fruit and vegetable packaging.

Greenpeace is now calling on the government to:

- reduce plastic production by at least 75% by 2040 and speed up the introduction of innovative reuse and refill models;
- completely ban all plastic waste exports by 2027 at the latest;
- immediately implement an all-in Deposit Return Scheme (DRS) and Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) requirements for recycling and reuse;
- end approvals for new incineration facilities.

"The plastic crisis hasn't gone away but our government is still tinkering at the edges of meaningful action. Recycling systems can't cope with the volume of plastic packaging we use, so the government and companies must act to turn off the tap at the source. Since Blue Planet II in 2018, the public has been clamoring for action on plastic pollution and, six years later, the government has run out of excuses. In this election year we urge you to join us for the return of The Big Plastic Count. We need UK ministers to stand up and push for an ambitious Global Plastics Treaty that radically reduces plastic production and accelerates national reuse and refill systems." **Nina Schrank, Head of Plastics, Greenpeace UK**

After six years of promises, the government has banned a few items like plastic straws, plates, trays, cutlery and balloon sticks while delaying more systemic measures like a deposit return scheme and completely failing to bring in binding plastic reduction targets. Banning a small number of individual plastic items will not lead to a meaningful reduction in single-use plastic overall. The Big Plastic Count




has demonstrated that **plastic food packaging is the biggest contributor to plastic waste** and needs addressing most urgently.

Please remember, this isn't about feeling guilty about the amount of plastic you use! Too much single-use plastic is produced and there aren't reusable alternatives that suit everyone's needs.

59,845 participants have already registered, including schools.

The poster opposite shows what is involved. Submit your count result and you will eventually receive your personal plastic footprint which will show where your waste ends up. Once all the results are analysed Greenpeace will share the national picture, and the next steps on pushing the government into action.

12 oz broccoli, broken into small florets	С

8 oz red onion, thinly chopped	4
3.5 oz of grated cheese	



Courgette and brie soup

3 courgettes – topped/tailed and sliced 1 medium onion – peeled and sliced

- 1 medium potato peeled and chopped
- 1 chicken stock cube
- 200 g brie cheese

Combine all together, and then add 450 ml mayonnaise 4 tablespoons of white wine vinegar 1 oz castor sugar Mix together and serve.

Place vegetables in large pan and just cover with water Bring to boil and add chicken stock cube Cook until tender and then add the sliced brie Stir until melted and then whisk until all blended Season to taste


