From the Rectory

A Late Developer

Dear Friends,

I've never been a great fan of slogans - especially religious ones! But I recall seeing someone wearing a T-shirt bearing the words, "Be patient; God isn't finished with me yet". This particular slogan has stayed with me and in recent years I've become aware of how, from earliest times, 'patience' (in particular the patience of God) has been valued and appreciated.



One person who believed himself to be on the receiving end of the Lord's patience was St Augustine, who was born in Roman North Africa in the fourth century. He had a devout Christian mother and a pagan father, was a notoriously rebellious teenager, and embarked on a fairly dissolute life. Remarkably, he became a priest, Bishop and world-renowned teacher of the faith.

Looking back on his life, he famously spoke of his frustration that so many of his life choices had, it seemed, led him away from the God who was so lovingly and patiently pursuing him. He wrote:

"Late have I loved you, beauty so old and so new: late have I loved you. And see, you were within and I was in the external world and sought you there, and in my unlovely state I plunged into those lovely created things which you made. You were with me, and I was not with you. The lovely things kept me far from you, though if they did not have their existence in you, they had no existence at all. You called and cried out loud and shattered my deafness. You were radiant and resplendent, you put to flight my blindness. You were fragrant, and I drew in my breath and now pant after you. I tasted you and I feel but hunger and thirst for you. You touched me and I am set on fire to attain the peace which is yours."

I frequently hear people say that they think of themselves as `seekers`, as people in search of God. However, just like Augustine, such people find themselves contradicted. That is, they eventually discover that it was not **they** who were searching for God but **God** who was patiently in search of them.

I wonder what YOUR experience is? Can you sense something of how God is in pursuit of you? As Augustine shows us: God can do great things through a `late developer`.

A NEW START FOR THE PARISH

During the service the Rural Dean, the Rev'd John Dixon, invited members of the wider community to greet the new Minister, and symbols of the different aspects of church life were presented to David by members from both Grange and Field Broughton, including two youngsters from the primary school. The choir sang the anthem 'Panis angelicus' (Bread of heaven) by Cesar Franck, and also John Rutter's anthem 'The Lord bless you and keep you'.

We were privileged to have the Deputy Lieutenant, Henry Bowring, with us (it happened to be his birthday and probably his last official appearance before retirement), and also Roger Handley, Mayor of Grange Town Council.

David was accompanied by his wife Margaret, and was supported by friends from his former parishes in Cumbria and further afield.

The service ended with an organ voluntary 'Postlude in C" by Henry Smart, after which everyone stayed for the refreshments.

A very happy event and a long-awaited welcome for our new Priest.

Proposed Improvements to Heating at St Paul's Church

As you may know, the heating of the main parts of St Paul's Church is by two gas boilers in the cellar and in February these boilers malfunctioned. After the boilers had been serviced they were restarted but it was clear that they were near the end of their asset lives. Replacement forms of heating were then considered.

- **Heat pumps** will not provide enough heat for a building of the design and shape of St Paul's and have been discarded as an option.
- Infrared electrical heaters fixed to the masonry just above the arches in the nave and aisles would provide warmth to the congregation and would only need to be switched on at the start of services, leading to savings in power costs. However, it is thought that they would not provide sufficient heat to the fabric of the church in the coldest periods in winter, leading to costly deterioration of the fabric and decor.

Therefore, the church architect has provided quotation documents which have been sent out to heating firms for them to provide St Paul's PCC with prices by mid-July for replacement gas boilers. When sufficient quotations have been received, the PCC will apply to the Diocese of Carlisle for a faculty to permit the boiler replacement to proceed. It is intended—and hoped—that more reliable heating will be installed by the winter.


PRAYERS FOR PETERTIDE ORDINANDS

General Election - #PrayYourPartAn invitation to pray for the nation



The bishops of the Church of England have issued a call to put prayer and participation at the heart of the General Election campaign as the UK prepares to go to the polls. They also issue a plea to everyone to put "good grace and a commitment to truth and integrity" at the heart of the campaign, with respect and kindness in the heat of debate.

Speaking after the Prime Minister Rishi Sunak announced the dissolution of Parliament ahead of an election on 4 July, Archbishops Justin Welby and Stephen Cottrell urged people to set aside time amid the heat of the coming campaign to reflect and pray for our nation and our world.

A series of daily thematic reflections written by bishops, drawn from the Bible and exploring major themes, will be published shortly, covering the final three weeks up to polling day. They will be available as a booklet, in audio form for smart speakers, as free opt-in emails and through social media. Throughout the coming weeks, a range of Christian voters from across England will be invited to share what they are praying for for the nation, through a series of videos under the banner #PrayYourPart.

THE SYCAMORE GAP TREE

A precious seedling, grown from seeds collected from the Sycamore Gap tree after it was felled last September, was placed in The Octavia Hill Garden by Blue Diamond with the National Trust at the Chelsea Flower Show. The seedling is one of a collection of small seedlings and buds propagated at the conservation charity's Plant Conservation Centre in Devon and the first to be on show to the public.



It was planted on Monday, 20th May, prior to the

show's public opening by Dame Judi Dench who is passionate about trees and was very concerned by the news of the felling of the Sycamore Gap tree last autumn. The much-loved tree had stood within a dip in Hadrian's Wall for around 200 years before it was felled in an act of vandalism last September, arousing unprecedented public reaction to the loss, in Northumberland and beyond.

Dame Judi was joined by 7-year-old Charlotte Crowe from Henshaw CofE Primary School in Northumberland, the closest school to Sycamore Gap. Charlotte won the opportunity to join Dame Judi in the Trust's Show Garden through a competition organised by the National Trust which invited children to draw a picture of the tree and write a short poem about what it meant to them.

When I go and see the tree it brings back lots of memories.



The National Trust has been looking after seeds from the iconic tree for months

at the Plant Conservation Centre, and the very first seedling was presented to King Charles on Monday, 27th May, which marked Celebration Day, an annual day to remember the lives of those who have died. The King will eventually plant the sapling in Windsor Great Park where it will be seen by many thousands each year and will be the first of many Sycamore Gap saplings planted at different places, in Northumberland and beyond.

HOW I CAME TO GRANGE - No. 22

I was born on the Wirral. My Dad was in the Royal Navy, and Mum and I lived with my grandparents until I was 4, when Dad left the Navy and we moved to Bromborough on the Wirral. Dad became "The Man from the Pru" and worked for the Prudential until he retired.

My family were all churchgoers and I grew up firstly in Sunday School and then church and youth club. My sister, Denise, was born when I was nearly 10. She went to Madrid, Spain, when she was 19, and has lived there with her family for 51 years.

I wasn't very keen on school and at the age of 15 I went to work at Lever Brothers in Port Sunlight, in the sales department. We then moved to Neston on the Wirral where I became friends with members of a rock band. Along with other friends I travelled around to different venues enjoying listening to their music. When I was 18, I became the girlfriend of the bass player in the band, David Calveley. In 1963 the band played as support group for the "Beatles" in the Majestic Hall, Birkenhead, very exciting for the girlfriends too.

Dave was an apprentice draftsman with Cammell Laird Shipbuilders on Merseyside. He attended the Presbyterian Church in Bebington where he lived. After his apprenticeship he applied and was accepted for a job with Collingwood Shipyard in Ontario, Canada. We married and emigrated to Collingwood. Our two children, Tracy and Todd, were born there. After 6 years we came back to the Wirral. Dave went back to work at Cammell Laird, and I followed my Dad into the "Pru" as a clerk in the office.

In 1989, Dave was offered two jobs, one in Vickers, as it was then, and the other at Swan Hunter on Tyneside, in the north-east. We visited both areas. I remember going to Barrow - it was a wet, cold and dull day and first impressions weren't good, and so we chose Tyneside and the nearby Northumberland countryside, knowing nothing of the wonderful countryside of the Lake District. We enjoyed camping, and had lots of camping holidays in this country and abroad, until Tracy and Todd followed their dreams and left home.

It seems ironic that 11 years later, in 2000, Dave was offered a job with BAE Systems, Barrow, and we set up home in Staveley-in-Cartmel and the beautiful countryside of the Lake District. Dave and I played an active part in St. Mary's Church, Staveley, but sadly Dave died 5 years later at the age of 62. I eventually came to Grange and to St Paul's Church. My children and their families are very supportive but live in Newcastle and Southampton, so my friends are very important to me. I have a busy and fulfilling life and wonderful friends to thank so much.

From Rags to Riches

The scale and impact of the textile industry on the environment is cause for concern at the highest levels, and the EU has set out why it wants to reduce waste and increase the life cycle and recycling of textiles towards achieving a circular economy by 2050.

According to the EU, one single cotton T-shirt uses 2,700 litres of fresh water in its production, enough to meet one person's drinking needs for two and a half years

The textile sector was the third biggest source of water degradation and land use globally in 2020, and textile production is estimated to be responsible for about 20% of global clean water pollution from dyeing and finishing products. The fashion industry is also estimated to be responsible for 10% of global carbon emissions, more than international flights and maritime shipping combined.

When it comes to waste clothing, only 1% in Europe is recycled into new clothes. According to the EU, 87% of used clothing is incinerated or goes into landfill.



- Reuse clothes in our wardrobes instead of buying new
- Make use of our charity shops for recycling
 - Perhaps take up a new hobby making rag rugs or patchwork hangings!

And when visiting Garden Centres

Who doesn't love a trip to the garden centre? Especially if it involves cake! Here are some reminders that will help you make better choices for the planet when you're buying plants.



- Use peat-free compost.
- Read the label. Was it grown in the British Isles or imported? Imported plants carry a greater risk of introducing pests and diseases.
- What is the pot made of? Is it plastic or something biodegradable?
- How long will it last? Is it worth buying annuals or could you fill your garden with perennials which last longer?

At the start of 2023, 500 Eco Churches had achieved a silver award. In just 18 months, this figure has doubled. This is evidence of churches deepening their engagement with caring for creation and embedding it in their church life.

2nd June-World Environment Day

Lord God,



RUDOLF NUREYEV

According to his last wishes, Rudolf Nureyev, the great Russian dancer, was buried in the Russian cemetery at Sainte-Geneviève-des-bois, near Paris. The ceremony took place on the 12th January 12, 1993.

His memorial was unveiled on Monday 6th May 1996. It was designed to look like a rug, but it is entirely made of bronze and glass. Rudolf Xämät uli Nuriev or Rudolf Nuréyev was born in the Soviet Union, considered, in fact, as one of the greatest dancers of the 20th century. It's not a canvas, it's not a mantle, it's not a rug - it's a spectacular mosaic of colours that resembles the kilim (hand-made rugs that covered the coffins of wanderers). The realism achieved in its shape, folds, colour and

texture make it one of the main tourist. attractions of this cemetery. Tt. was designed bv his friend Ezio Frigerio, whom he met after one of his performances in the Romeo and ballet *Juliet*.





TWO APPLES

"Today in one of our classes I introduced the children to two apples (the children didn't know, but before the class I had repeatedly dropped one of the apples on the floor, you couldn't tell, both apples looked perfect). We talked about the apples and the children described how both apples looked the same; both were red, were of similar size, and looked juicy enough to eat.

I picked up the apple I'd dropped on the floor and started to tell the children how I disliked this apple, that I thought it was disgusting, it was a horrible colour and the stem was just too short. I told them that because I didn't like it I didn't want them to like it either, so they should call it names too.

Some children looked at me like I was insane, but we passed the apple around the circle calling it names, 'you're a smelly apple', 'I don't even know why you exist', 'you've probably got worms inside you', etc.

We really pulled this poor apple apart. I actually started to feel sorry for the little guy.

We then passed another apple around and started to say kind words to it, 'You're a lovely apple', 'Your skin is beautiful', 'What a beautiful colour you are', etc.

I then held up both apples, and again, we talked about the similarities and differences, there was no change, both apples still looked the same.

I then cut the apples open. The apple we'd been kind to was clear, fresh and juicy inside. The apple we'd said unkind words to was bruised and all mushy inside.

I think there was a lightbulb moment for the children immediately. They really got it! What we saw inside that apple - the bruises, the mush and the broken bits - is what is happening inside every one of us when someone mistreats us with their words or actions.

When people are bullied, especially children, they feel horrible inside and sometimes don't show or tell others how they are feeling. If we hadn't cut that apple open, we would never have known how much pain we had caused it.

I shared my own experience of suffering someone's unkind words last week. On the outside I looked OK, I was still smiling. But, on the inside someone had caused me a lot of pain with their words and I was hurting.

Unlike an apple, we have the ability to stop this from happening. We can teach children that it's not ok to say unkind things to each other, and discuss how it makes others feel. We can teach our children to stand up for each other and to stop any form of bullying, just as one little girl did today when she refused to say unkind words to the apple.

More and more hurt and damage happens inside if nobody does anything to stop the bullying. Let's create a generation of kind, caring children.

The tongue has no bones, but is strong enough to break a heart. So be careful with your words."

Charity Bike Ride in memory of Hairy Biker Dave Myers

The 'Dave Day' ride out on Saturday, 8th June, will bring together bikers from across the country, and friends and fans of Dave in a heartfelt tribute. Thousands of bikers are expected to travel from London to Barrow-in-Furness – Dave's hometown. The ride is being organised by volunteers and will be led by Dave's fellow Hairy

Biker, Si King, and Dave's friend Jason 'Woody' Woodcock.

Dave Myers sadly died from cancer in February this year, aged 66. His widow has chosen The Institute of Cancer Research, which is both a research institute and a charity, as one of the recipients of the monies raised, alongside Childline.

'Dave Day' takes place on Saturday 8th June 2024, and it will see bikers from across the UK and beyond take part in a 300+ mile trek from North London to Barrow.
