From the Rectory

The Direction of Travel....

Dear Friends,

There once was a rich man who was near death. He was very grieved because he had worked so hard for his money and he wanted to be able to take it with him to heaven. So, he began to pray that he might be able to take some of his wealth with him. An angel hears his plea and appears to him, "Sorry, but you can't take your wealth with you". The man implores the angel to speak to God to see if He might bend the rules. The man continues to pray that his wealth could follow him. The angel reappears and informs the man that God has decided to allow him to take one suitcase with him. Overjoyed, the man gathers his largest suitcase and fills it with pure gold bars and places it beside his bed.

Soon afterward the man dies and shows up at the Gates of Heaven where he's met by St. Peter. Seeing the suitcase Peter says, "Hold on, you can't bring that in here!" But the man explains to him that he has permission and asks him to verify his story with the Lord. Sure enough, Peter checks and comes back saying, "You're right. You are allowed one carry-on bag but I'm supposed to check its contents before letting it through". Peter opens the suitcase to inspect the worldly items that the man found too precious to leave behind and exclaims, "You brought pavement?!?!"

There are few things more tedious than analysing jokes...! But religious jokes (like that very poor one) are often based on two assumptions. Firstly, that death involves going to a place called 'Heaven', complete with 'pearly' gates and St. Peter, and, secondly, that life is all about trying to do enough of the right things in order to get INTO this place called 'Heaven'.

So deeply ingrained are these assumptions, reinforced by the telling and re-telling of many a good joke, it comes as something of a surprise to realise that this isn't what Christians believe at all. No, the teaching of Jesus is that Heaven is not a place where I am going so much as a place that's invading where I am.

Time and again Jesus speaks of the Kingdom of Heaven (God's space) being in our midst and springing up in small, apparently insignificant but irresistible ways. Our task is to recognise the signs, repent (drop your agenda for living) and get with the flow.

In fact, the more you reflect on His life and ministry the more you realise that Jesus seems totally preoccupied with doing things which demonstrate what it looks like when the world is under this 'new management...' - when Heaven comes to earth.

In other words, this is the direction of travel; and this, after all, is the message we're really celebrating at Christmas: "God With US": the grace, goodness, truth and beauty of God coming out to meet us. St. Paul says that in Jesus "the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation to all" (Titus 2.11). Jesus' cross and resurrection tell us that a new world order has been established. Sin and death will not have the final word. The pressure (to justify ourselves) is off and a new regime (of grace and mercy) is in place.

As for what happens when we die? Well, we go to our rest and we await the Resurrection and what the Book of Revelation calls "New heavens and a new earth": when the Lord God finally puts all things to rights.

In the meantime, we have a job to do. Firstly, Jesus tells us to pray, "Thy Kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven". Secondly, we're called to let God make us living examples of what citizens of this new Kingdom look like: in short, Christ-shaped people. That is, after all, what the name 'Christian' means.

The Top 100 Most Read Bible Verses (Part 2)

(All verses are quoted from the New International Version.)

- 21. **John** 14:6: Jesus answered, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.

NEWS FROM THE DIOCESE

Bishop Rob's Easter message

In his Easter message, the Acting Bishop of Carlisle reflects on how God is always at work even when we may feel alone.

The Rt Rev Rob Saner-Haigh, who was filmed at St John's Church, Keswick, draws on the quiet of Holy Saturday as being a time when Jesus' followers would have felt defeated following his crucifixion. But Bishop Rob continues: "On that Saturday, there appears to be no happy ending, no rescue, no victory. But then, early on the Sunday, Mary, then Peter and John, then others, discover that the tomb is empty. Jesus is Alive! All that he promised, all that he said would happen, has come true. Hope is reborn. Death is dead, love has won, Christ has conquered!"

Cathedral Chrism Eucharist

Dozens of clergy and lay ministers from across the Diocese of Carlisle came together on Tuesday, 15th April, for a Chrism Eucharist service at Carlisle Cathedral.

They were joined by Bishop Rob and other senior leadership colleagues, the date having been moved from Maundy Thursday when the service was held in previous years.

With music by the Cathedral Consort and a worship group, all made a renewal of their commitment to ministry, remembering that Jesus came not to be served but to serve. Oils were blessed for pastoral use in parishes throughout the coming year – to offer blessing to those who are sick, those to be baptised, and those to be confirmed.



The Spring 2025 edition of 'The Way' - the ecumenical digital newspaper for the Church in Cumbria - has just been published.

It focuses on health and wellbeing and looks at what churches, faith communities and individuals are doing to support each other and those around them.

West Cumbrian vicar, the Rev Paul Kerry, and his congregant, Phil Hall, speak about their volunteer work as members of the Wasdale Mountain Rescue Team, we interview 87-year-old the Rev Ken Wright who has just retired from his hospital chaplaincy after 28 years, and there's a feature on the ministry of Methodist minister and agricultural chaplain, the Rev David Newlove, to raise awareness of mental



health pressures within farming communities. There are also features on the work of pioneer minister the Rev Sharon Murphy in Workington, and all the fun, fellowship and faith which is being nurtured in a new form of church in Barrow.



On Thursday, 24th April, a cheque for £750 was handed over to Brian, Churchwarden, by Jane Thedham, leader of the Bay Community Singers following a very successful concert held in St Paul's last month. The money is going towards the cost of the new heating system which has recently been installed.

We are very grateful to Jane and all the members of her choir, and we very much forward to future events.





'SON'-RISE SERVICE ON EASTER DAY

Members of churches around Grange and District gathered to greet the Risen Lord on Easter Day. It was a wonderful sunrise and Rev'd David Edmundson from the Methodist Church led an uplifting act of worship. Following the service the fellowship continued with hot drinks and hot cross buns provided by St Paul's Church.

After a meaningful and thought-provoking journey through Lent led by our Vicar, who offered us a varied programme of ways to observe this time, Holy Week brought us to Good Friday. The morning was spent with a workshop for young people, with the telling of the Easter story along with songs, video, crafts and hot cross buns.





Easter Day began with the ecumenical 'Son'-rise service led by the Revd David Edmondson (see page 11) followed by hot-cross buns in St Paul's.

Our baptismal vows were reaffirmed, the Vicar sprinkling the congregation with blessed water from the font by means of a branch of rosemary.

Dear Friends

I have had so many cards and letters from you all following Jill's death that I hope you will forgive this shared letter. Your expressions of love and your prayers have meant a great deal – as indeed they have over the challenging years we have faced as Jill's health declined. It was a hugely difficult decision we made in 2009 to leave Cumbria after Jill had been ill, but I realised then that time might be limited, and we were indeed able to enjoy just three good years with our four (then) tiny grandsons before Jill's mobility deteriorated.



Since then Jill has become increasingly dependant on help, but bore her indignities and pain with grit and (mostly) humour – rather more than I could do at times. When we were forced to leave our Somerset cottage and come to Southampton in 2019, she accepted Professional Care, and we have been so lucky with those who have helped us. In the last three years she has had Care four times a day, from an international and multi-faith team who were both respectful and full of humour. Jill said "I never expected to have a Sikh, a Muslim, or a Buddhist dealing with the intimate parts of my life!" But they did, and we have learned so much from each other.

My two prayers – that I should have health and strength to see Jill to journey's end, and that she would have a peaceful death – were both granted, and I was with her as she slipped away into the next great adventure. I know that she is now at rest with the Lord.

Jill's funeral was a thanksgiving at which so many friends who have supported us were present; it was very special that Penny and Sue were with us, Penny reading the lesson, our old friend Graeme Knowles, one-time Dean of Carlisle, gave a superb address, and George and Jane Howe (our former Archdeacon) were also with us. The family are keeping a close eye on me, and our four strapping grandsons are caring for Grandad!

Thank you all for being in touch. Now I have more freedom I hope to visit Cumbria later in the year to see you all.

Eco Church

Caring for God's Earth encourages us to join them in prayer, believing that together our individual actions and prayers will

collectively contribute to positive change as we seek to protect and restore the environment for the blessing of all in our communities and to the glory of God.

WEEK 3 (19th MAY) the prayer is for our POLLINATORS

Nearly 90% of the world's wild flowering plant species depend, entirely or at least in part, on animal pollination. Butterflies and bees are important pollinators in the UK and we want to encourage churches, land owners and individuals to take action for their survival. Pray for increased awareness and action for bees and other pollinators as we mark **World Bee Day on the 20th May.**

There are 270 species of bee in Britain and Ireland. Generally they reside in any habitat, as long as there is a place for them to build a hive, abundant flowering plants, and a water source. Like many other insects, bees are crucial pollinators, but numbers are declining because of habitat loss, climate change and agricultural intensification. Honeybees currently have no legal protection in the UK so they need all the help they can get!

How we can help

- Plant bee-friendly plants and flowers (rich in nectar).
- Transform your garden into a buzz of activity: grow flowering plants all year round and be part of creating the largest nature reserve in Britain our gardens. If you do not have a garden, use windowsills and hanging baskets.
- Provide a source of shallow water in your greenspace (a shallow bowlful is fine!).
- Create suitable habitats through suitable mowing and cutting regimes and allow some area of grass to grow taller.
- Avoid using pesticides whenever possible, and check chemicals to see if they contain neonicotinoids.
- Use peat-free compost.
- Support farmers looking after their land in wildlife-friendly ways. Buy local, organic produce.

Did you know that bees cannot see the colour red but they can see the ultraviolet patterns in flowers so they do visit red flowers!



Nature can be experienced when we notice an insect, hear a bird sing, feel the earth beneath our hands, or even when we watch a documentary. There is strong evidence that nature is also good for mental health. Try to immerse yourself in nature every day, even for just a few minutes, and give thanks to God for His good creation.



SPONGE CAKE FROM MRS BEATON

My soon-to-be daughter-in-law Donna bought me this wonderful cookery book from 1912, a Mrs Beeton's Family Cookery, New Edition.

It's a fascinating book, all in alphabetical order so it can be like a needle in a haystack trying to find a recipe.

The other day I was searching for a Victoria sponge cake, and found the following which I found quite strange and funny.

I have written it as it is shown in the book.



SPONGE CAKE

Ingredients - The weight of 8 eggs in caster sugar, the weight of 5 eggs in flour, the rind of 1 lemon, 1 tablespoon of brandy.

Method - Put the eggs into one side of the scale, and take the weight of 8 in caster sugar, and the weight OF 5 in good, dry flour. Separate the yolks from the whites of the eggs; beat in the former, put them into a saucepan with the sugar, and let them remain over the fire until milk-warm, keeping them well stirred. Then put them into a basin, add the grated lemon rind, mixed with the brandy, and beat the ingredients well together. Whisk the whites of the eggs to a very stiff froth, stir them into the other ingredients, and beat the cake well for ¼ of an hour. Then take out the whisk, sieve in the flour, and mix it lightly with a wooden spoon. Put it into a buttered mold dusted

out with a little finely sifted sugar and flour, and bake the cake in a quick oven for 1½ hours. Care must be taken that it is put in the oven immediately, or it will not be light. The Flavoring of this cake may be varied by adding a few drops of essence of almonds, instead of the grated lemon rind.


Time - 11/2 hours


