



Words that go with you

Dear Friends,

There is a prayer, much beloved by Orthodox Christians, known as 'The Jesus Prayer'. Its basic form is,

"Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the Living God, have mercy on me, a sinner"

Many Christians find it helpful to sit quietly for a while each day simply repeating these words as a way of opening their heart and mind to God. Indeed, it's a prayer we can carry around with us throughout the day following St Paul's encouragement that we should "pray constantly".

I recently heard a man speak of how his wife was especially fond of this prayer. In fact, it became so much a part of her that medical staff realised she was saying this prayer while she was still unconscious and recovering from a serious operation!

All of which got me thinking about those prayers and verses of scripture which have a special meaning for us. I wonder what words of Jesus, what words of comfort or encouragement, what promises of God you will carry with you as this woman did?

What words will you carry with you throughout your day, so as to open your heart and mind to God? What words will you take with you in moments as significant as an operation, or when you prepare to meet the Lord?

is a good place to start.



EVENSONG AT ST PAUL'S

Sunday 29th June it was advertised as an Evensong service at St Paul's commencing at 5 pm. I thought I would go along and in preparation I wondered how long it had been in our church since this type of afternoon service may have been held. I rather suspect that the regular Evensong services held each Sunday fizzled out in the mid-1990's simply due to the lack of numbers attending. I recall Ann Waller who was choir mistress at that time being quite disappointed along with many of her then choir members who very

much liked the music and singing that accompanied such a service. I suspect the Rev'd Alan Gibson was the last incumbent of our church to preside at an Evensong service, but this service was led by our Vicar, Rev'd David Wilmot.

It turned out that the recent Evensong was a very memorable occasion and most uplifting because of the wonderful musical accompaniment by Charles Edmondson and a very talented group of choir members he had assembled. He called them the "Gloriana Singers". They were magnificent under Charles' conducting manner and assisted by some wonderful organ playing by a friend of Charles, who regularly plays at Kendal Parish Church. Charles told me that the choir he had brought were singing in preparation for a concert he and they were soon to perform in Lincolnshire.

There were about 40 present in the congregation and roughly 20 people connected with his choir. We witnessed some very fine choral singing indeed. After the service, many of those like me went over to Charles to compliment him and his singers. We agreed that the highlight was the singing of "The Lord is my Shepherd" psalm, where when we closed our eyes it was exactly the same as we recalled from the signature tune for the Vicar of Dibley! When we opened our eyes though we couldn't see the

programme credits, nor the vehicles trundling down the escarpment of that particular section of the Chiltern Hills where the M40 passes by the fictional village of Dibley!

The service was a fitting tribute to the "Glory of God" and a most wonderful occasion that could match anything heard in any of our English cathedrals. Grateful appreciation to you, Charles, and all those you persuaded to come to our church.

A FAREWELL TO MRS PHILLIPA SUMMERS

After a long career lasting 37 years in teaching, with 13 years spent as Headteacher at Grange CE Primary School, Mrs Summers has now retired, and we wish her well.

Mrs Summers was appointed as Headteacher in September 2011, taking over from Colin Milner. During the last 13 years the school has been very successful with excellent SIAMs inspection results and very good OFSTED reports. The school curriculum is broad and we have good SATs results in KS1 & KS2, plus early years and Yr1 phonics tests.

The school has grown in number and we now have over 159 children, plus a large nursery which includes 2-year-olds +. We provide full wrap-around child care from breakfast club to after-school club, along with 2-week holiday provision for children, which makes Grange school even more attractive to working parents.

There have been challenges - curriculum changes, managing budgets, and providing continued education during Covid in 2020 - which were all achieved admirably.

'Achieve, believe, care' and a new school mission statement was developed around Hebrews 10, v24 ... 'Let us think of ways to motivate one another to acts of love and good works'...and this lies at the heart of school life.

There have been great achievements in many sports, from cross-country running, rounders to football, with competitions across the Cartmel Peninsula and Cumbria. Children have also had fantastic cultural opportunities - visits to London, York, being part of 'Sing Up' in Manchester arena, and art gallery and theatre visits. Outdoor activities have been especially important, with the annual school day at Castlehead Field Centre, the Yrs 5/6 overnight visits to Ullswater, and in the past to Ridley Hall, with the focus to include 'being active outdoors'.

Mrs Summers and the staff have continued the very strong links with St Paul's, and the Church have been welcomed in school via Collective Worship, with Rev Nick Ash, Curate Andrew Norman, Rev David Wilmot, Colin Milner, along with Minister Jo Rand from the Methodist Church. St Paul's parishioners have run a weekly Church Club, 'Fun & Friendship' after-school events each term, together with regular class visits to St Paul's, and for end-of-term services. With guidance from Mrs Summers the children have played a large part in Church celebrations, eg Remembrance Day service and the Christmas Tree Festival opening, etc.



We wish her well and say a tremendous 'thank you' for being a wonderful, caring Headteacher at Grange School, who has provided an excellent education for our local children over the past 13 years!

We are very pleased that Mrs Paula Whinfield, Yr 6 teacher, has been appointed the new Headteacher. We are sure she will continue to do a wonderful job.

NEWS FROM THE DIOCESE

College of Canons - Bishop 'Election'



The next stage towards the appointment of Bishop Rob Saner-Haigh as the next Bishop of Carlisle has taken place at Carlisle Cathedral.

The College of Canons gathered for their Annual Meeting when they also formally 'elected' Bishop Rob as our next Diocesan bishop. As governed by the Appointment of Bishops Act 1533, only members of Chapter and Honorary Canons formally participate in the Election itself. The College of Canons do not 'elect' a bishop in the modern sense, but confirm that, through the process of prayerful discernment the Church has followed, Bishop Rob is 'elect' in his calling to be the 68th Bishop of Carlisle. Please continue to pray for Bishop Rob and all his family as he prepares to take up the position later this year.

General Synod: some interesting, helpful and challenging issues

The Church of England's General Synod members have returned from their conference at York following the summer sessions which took place from 11–15th July. A busy agenda included items on Assisted Suicide, redress for survivors of church-based abuse, church growth, and a presentation given by The Most Rev Hosam Naoum, the Archbishop in Jerusalem.

Archbishop Hosam said: "I realise that as a church we live and embody the gospel and we are not politicians. However, we need to speak out in the face of injustices and be prophetic for the sake of our people and our calling as Christians. But where a church is wounded and constrained, we need the wider body of Christ to help us to be the church in brutal and damaging times."

The Diocese of Jerusalem is home to about 7,000 Anglicans worshipping within 28 different congregations (many members are Palestinians). It is also responsible for more than 30 institutions, including hospitals, schools, clinics and rehabilitation centres. The Diocese is scattered across five separate countries or territories: Jordan, Palestine, Lebanon, Syria, and Israel.

'THE LAST SUPPER'



Have you seen the 4-metre sculpture in Kendal Parish Church, created by Peter Barnes? It is crafted from 50,000 reclaimed computer keys in a mosaic inspired by Leonardo da Vinci's famous painting which depicts Jesus and his disciples.

The sculpture is inlaid with hidden messages, symbols, and pathways, and has been displayed in various churches and locations, including Windsor, Chester, and Dorchester.

It has been on display in Holy Trinity since Easter but we are not sure for how much longer.

The Transfiguration is the last painting by the Italian High Renaissance master Raphael, hailed by many as his finest work.

The painting is divided into two distinct sections: the upper part depicts the Transfiguration of Christ, with Christ surrounded by Moses and Elijah and bathed in divine light. The lower part portrays the apostles struggling to heal a possessed boy, showcasing human suffering and earthly turmoil.

Cardinal Giulio de Medici — who later became Pope Clement VII — commissioned the work, conceived as an altarpiece for Narbonne Cathedral in France; Raphael worked on it in the years preceding his death in 1520. The painting is now housed in the Pinacoteca Vaticana in Vatican City.

We Don't Need Perfect Activists 'We don't need 100 perfect activists, but millions of imperfect ones.'

We live in a world that is deeply flawed, marked by inequality, injustice, misinformation, and escalating environmental crises. These are not small cracks in the system; they are deep fractures that shape the lives of millions. And yet, despite the clear imperfections all around us, we are constantly surrounded by images of 'perfection'.

Everywhere we turn, we are sold the promise of a perfect life. Products claim to perfect our appearance, our homes, our gardens, even our personalities. Social media relentlessly portrays flawless lives. The workplace demands ever higher standards of efficiency and output, leaving little space for failure or imperfection. The pressure to appear perfect is in every corner of our daily existence.

Perfection has become a lucrative industry; our desire to live a perfect life is driving consumerism by convincing us that we are not enough as we are. Even the self-help world has carved out a niche, based on teaching us how to let go of perfection, often by selling us yet another version of 'the right way' to live.

There is something deeply contradictory in all of this. In our pursuit of perfection, we risk losing the essence of what makes us human, our vulnerability, our messiness, our capacity to learn through mistakes.

Worse still, the idea of perfection is now being used as a means to silence. In a world that urgently needs courageous voices to speak out against what is happening, the narrative of 'if your life isn't perfectly aligned, if you've ever been inconsistent, if you've ever fallen short you have no right to speak' prevails.

This is a silencing tactic, designed to paralyse people with guilt and self-doubt rather than inspire collective progress. The culture of perfection has become a weapon to distract, to discredit, and to silence. At PEAT we believe that all of our imperfect efforts to bring about a greener, fairer, future matter. In the words of Leonard Cohen, 'There's a crack in everything, that's how the light gets in.' What would it be like if we accept more of our own imperfections and less of the imperfections we see in the world?

The Big Butterfly Count 2025 Friday 18th July to Sunday 10th August 2025, 6 am-10 pm

Have you noticed that there seem to be more butterflies about this year than last?

Would you like to take part in some citizen science? How about taking part in the Big Butterfly Count?

The instructions are simple:

Taking part in the Big Butterfly Count only takes 15 minutes of your time but that can help to make a huge difference. Simply follow the below steps to submit your counts between 18th July and 10th August.

1. Download the mobile app or sign in through the website:

https://bigbutterflycount.butterfly-conservation.org

- 2. Find a sunny spot
- 3. Spend 15 minutes counting butterflies & moths
- 4. Record what species you see & how many there are

Counting butterflies can be described as taking the pulse of nature and we depend on you, our citizen scientists, to help us assess how much help nature needs. The data from this and other counts will also help us to identify important trends in species that will assist us in planning how to protect butterflies from extinction, as well as understanding the effect of climate change on wildlife.

We thank the 2329 people who took part in the Big Butterfly Count 2024 in Norfolk during the summer, counting 27,885 butterflies and day-flying moths.

Gatekeeper was our no. 1, jumping from 4th place in 2023. Despite this its numbers were still down by over a quarter. Our chart topper last year, Peacock, fell to no. 5 with its numbers down by an average of 70% per count, while Red Admiral at number 2 in 2023 slipped to no. 6 with a 75% reduction.

Avoid Plastic

"We are being choked to death by the amount of plastic that we throw away. It's killing our oceans, it's entering our bodies in the fish we eat" - Kevon Bacon

• Carry reusable bags: always have shopping bags with you to avoid using new plastic bags.



- Use reusable containers: opt for refillable bottles and containers instead of single-use plastic ones.
- Avoid cling film: use reusable wraps like beeswax wraps, silicone stretch lids, or containers for leftovers.
- Buy in bulk: reduce packaging by purchasing items in larger quantities.
- Choose products with minimal packaging: be mindful of packaging when shopping and opt for items with less plastic.

NATURE'S BALANCE

This exhibit stands in the square outside the City Hall in the centre of Copenhagen.

Using the analogy of the Jenga game, it gives a powerful message of how we need to work together to save our wildlife.

"There is a balance in nature between the many different species of plants and animals. The individual species live off and with each other, just like the bricks supporting the tower here. Since the 1970s human activities have significantly affected over half of the world's wildlife. As species become extinct, the bricks disappear and the tower wobbles."

"Transport and travel have come up repeatedly in our community conversations, often with solutions that are only temporary fixes. Our question is what if travel could be something we actually look forward to? Something safe, clean, easy, affordable, and accessible for everyone? The safe part resonates with our recent survey. At PEAT, we believe the people who live in and visit the Peninsula know best what their community needs. That's why we launched the project, supported by Future Proof Cumbria (formerly CAfS) and Deliberate CIC, gathering the views of young people, commuters, older residents, people with limited mobility, business owners, visitors, and local councils. Every voice matters as we work together to explore how travel and transport can better serve our communities."



THOMAS EDISON

One day a little boy came running home with a letter in his hand. "The teacher asked me to give this to you... and said only you should read it, no one else", he told his mother. She read the letter silently. Her eyes filled with tears, but she smiled and said, "The teacher writes that you are a genius. The school doesn't have the facilities or the teachers to properly educate you. So he recommends that I teach you at home." And that's exactly what she did — with love, patience, and belief in her son. Years passed. The mother passed away, and the boy grew up to become one of the greatest inventors in history - Thomas Alva Edison.



One day, now an adult, he happened to find that same letter. He opened it out of curiosity - and what he read stunned him. In reality, the letter said: "Your child is mentally deficient. We cannot allow him to attend our school anymore." Edison cried for a long time. Then he wrote in his diary: "I was a child with learning difficulties, but I had a mother who was brave enough to make me believe I was a genius. And so I became one".

Incredible, isn't it? She could have told him the truth and broken him, but she chose otherwise. She gave him words that became his wings for life. That's the power of words. And that's what it means to believe in someone when no one else does.

Remember: What you say to a child stays in their heart for ever. So guard your words, because they can destroy - or save, break - or lift up. And, like that mother, don't let someone else's words define who you are. Write your own story. And most importantly... never give up.

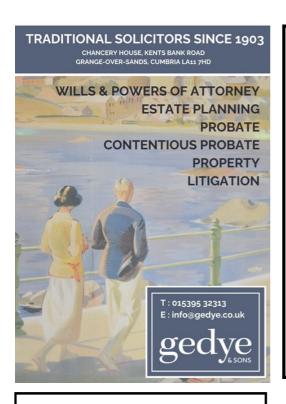
