# Giving Thanks

Dear Friends,

Perhaps, like me, you can recall being told the story of King Canute? I remember it as a story about the rather foolish king who, flattered by his courtiers, thought that he could hold back the waves on the beach. This is the story that's behind that old expression: "You can't turn back the tide".

But (perhaps to my shame) it was only fairly recently that I learnt that poor old Canute has been much maligned and that what he actually wanted to do was demonstrate to his flattering courtiers that, on the contrary, he most certainly couldn't turn back the tide. The moral of the tale is, therefore, that even though he was the King, there were appropriate limits to his power and authority. King Canute wanted to make the point that even he, especially he, stood subject to the authority of God.

I suspect that (like me) many generations of people have also miss-heard this tale and it will probably continue to go down as an example of hubris and vanity rather than holiness. However, I think I warm to this discovery about Canute. I'm attracted by this picture of someone who was not only appropriately humble but who therefore tried to point folk in the direction of something, or some-one, bigger than themselves.

This, I think, is the particular characteristic, the special gift for which many of us recall Her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth. Yes, we remember her exemplary service to the nation but, if there is one particular thing which stood out as the mainstay of her life, it was her faith.

Time and again, not least in her many Christmas messages, she acknowledged the limits of her position. In 2000, she said, "For me, the teachings of Christ and my own personal accountability before God provide a framework in which I try to lead my life". We might say that she bore her (yes, constitutional) authority very lightly and continually pointed us to something bigger than ourselves.

For that, we give thanks and we continue to pray for all who bear high office, and in particular those who are inclined towards hubris. May we also respect the limits of what they can offer. It is not their job to be our saviour. For that, we need to look elsewhere.

#### **NEWS FROM THE DIOCESE**

#### MESSAGE FROM BISHOP ROB

"We have been given permission to appoint a new Bishop of Penrith and the official notice of this was released on Friday 10th October. I have invited a diverse advisory group, drawn from across the diocese and wider church, to assist me with this appointment. The new Bishop will have some specific work around evangelism and encouraging vocations, and will join me in caring for and encouraging clergy, ministers and parishes across the diocese and ecumenical county. He/she will need to be someone who knows and is known. The candidate information pack states that we are looking for someone who will open the scriptures and our Christian tradition in ways which challenge, encourage and excite us and draw us closer to God. We seek someone who, when we spend time with them, leaves us more excited about Jesus. People are invited to suggest suitable names to me, and interviews will be held in early January. If the person appointed is not already a bishop, we hope they will be consecrated on April 30th at York and will start with us as soon as possible after that. Please join me in praying that God will send us a suffragan bishop after His own heart."



#### BISHOP ROB'S ENTHRONEMENT AND DIOCESAN TOUR

Bishop Rob will be enthroned as the 68th Bishop of Carlisle on **Saturday, 29th November at 2 pm** at Carlisle Cathedral. The service will be livestreamed, and you can keep up with all the latest details by visiting the Cathedral website.

In the weeks before the enthronement, Bishop Rob will tour the diocese's deaneries. Each meeting offers a chance to pray together, hear his reflections, and share your hopes and insights for our diocese moving forward. All are welcome to attend the open deanery synods. Over 30 people gathered in the social area at St Paul's on a Tuesday evening to listen to Penny Driver talking about her time spent in Sri Lanka.



As the Youth Officer in the Diocese of Ripon and Leeds she was asked by her Bishop to consider leading a small party of youngsters to Sri Lanka as part of the link between that Diocese and the Dioceses of Colombo and Kurunegala. After a preliminary visit eight youngsters aged between 17 and 25 were chosen to spend 3 months on the island, living with local families and experiencing their way of life. (Interestingly, two of those

youngsters went on to become ordained.)

Dressed in a beautiful silk sari, Penny illustrated her talk with a series of slides, separated under the following headings: people, culture, religion, faith and issues. Also



on display were various artefacts she had acquired, including items made by a women's co-operative and a wooden replica of the Sri Lankan cross.

Following a time for questions, five different curries were served and enjoyed.

The evening raised £226 which is being sent to the Church of Ceylon Orphanage.

## BURNESIDE BRASS BAND CONCERT 26<sup>TH</sup> October

We were delighted to welcome our friends from Burneside and a most delightful and enjoyable Sunday afternoon was spent by all. Conducted by Dave Higson, the Musical Director, the programme was varied, the introductions by Jim (principal cornet) were informative, witty and amusing, and the playing by the talented individuals of the highest standard.

The programme opened with the rousing Sousa's 1890 march *The Liberty Bell* (famous more recently as the Monty Python theme tune) which captured the audience's attention and we proceeded through various arrangements of known (and less well known) melodies featuring different parts of the band: a hymn tune by Howard Cuthbert showing the depth of sound of the band as a whole, *Drummer's Delight* to show the



talents of Simon Carr on drums, *Calling Cornwall* commissioned by the BBC as theme music for Radio Cornwall, and *Grandfather's Clock* played as a euphonium solo by Eleanor Knowles, for whom this was her final performance with the band before she moves on to a more demanding musical environment.

We wish her well. A version of a Russian folk song *Kalinka* concluded the first half.

Features of the second half were Mozart's *Eine Kleine Nachtmusik* played on a Double EE flat bass tuba (who would have thought that Mozart could go so low or a tuba show such agility?) and the Henry Mancini's *Pink Panther* theme played on the bass trombone in a most flamboyant (and expressive) manner.



The band amused and entertained us, as well as stressing the community-uniting nature of its work as it encourages young players and oversees their learning and development, aided by finance from the band's own funds raised from performances like ours. We tapped our feet, donated generously (aiding the church as well) and look forward to their next visit. Thank you, Burneside, and to our Social Committee for bringing them to us.

#### THE OTHER SIDE OF GRANGE

Following my road accident in January and subsequent hospital treatment I was told that I must no longer use stairs, so, on top of other tasks, Peter (with help from me in my hospital bed) started looking for other suitable accommodation. We considered flats in Leeds near our daughter and local sheltered housing but, thankfully, after a few setbacks settled on one of two available two-bedroom flats in Grange close to friends, church, Parkinson's treatment for Peter, and our beloved Lake District (where there is still one Wainwright waiting for us to climb!).

We were very sad to leave Cart Lane with its incredible views of the bay and Ingleborough, sunrises, loving neighbours, our garden full of bonsai trees, and the absence of traffic noise to live in the centre of Grange in a flat. One of our daughters said we would be seeing a different side of Grange-over-Sands, how right she was.

I never realised just how busy Main Street can be day and night (when the Royal Mail delivery van arrives at the Post Office about 5 am and its contents are trundled in noisy wheeled crates into their courtyard). There are often two lanes of traffic with cars jostling for parking space round massive vehicles delivering to the shops and eateries near the Post Office, not to mention the frequent cars travelling the wrong way up the one-way system! Many more buses than I knew we had in Grange pull up at the bus stop for passengers getting off and on. Tractors, builders' lorries and vehicles with trailers pass throughout the day going either up the hill to Cartmel or turning left into Grange. What are they all doing?

The number of pedestrians, many of whom I recognise, of course, visiting Spar or the Post Office or waiting for a bus amazes me, but there is also a large number of tourists strolling round looking at the view and for shops or dropping in to The Keg and Kitchen (whose pizzas on Friday and Saturday attract crowds of hungry customers).

I never realised how many people, like myself, need walking sticks or crutches for support or walk with a limp. There is a surprising number and variety of dogs and cyclists and runners. It's apparent how the colour and style of people's clothes have changed due to the weather since we moved here, and we can estimate the day's temperature by what people are wearing.

I love this new form of entertainment, people watching, from my swivel chair by a huge second-floor window giving me views of Main Street, Eggerslack Woods and St Paul's Church in one direction, and the roofs of Grange and distant Morecambe Bay the other. I miss having the trains go by and the tides coming in and out but love to hear the quarterly hour strikes from the Clock Tower.



The view of St Paul's is wonderful, as you can see from my picture of the school children arriving for their harvest festival service in Storm Amy.

I see visitors as well as our congregation going in and out of the church, and am thankful to be able to walk across and join them, but a bit sad that I can no longer walk up to Fell Church.

To all who visited, sent cards, good wishes and offered prayers for me and my family I send my love and thanks. It's wonderful to be back.

I had a woman with 3 boys and a middle-aged couple come in. It was the couple who stayed chatting. I didn't advertise the opening and I didn't expect anyone to come, but I'm glad I did.

And the church looks so much loved after our recent boon day."

#### A BOUNTIFUL HARVEST

On the first Sunday in October we celebrated Harvest at St Paul's. The PCC had agreed that the offerings this year would be in support of the Foodbank at Barrow. On the Friday afternoon the children from Grange Primary School walked to the church (in the pouring rain at the start of Storm Amy), bringing with them their gifts, which were presented at the altar during their special harvest festival service. Later the gifts collected at Lindale Primary School were added.





On the Sunday 70 people were present for the main morning service led by the Revd David Wilmot, when further donations were brought by parishioners. After the service a delicious lunch was enjoyed by all, the first course delivered from the Old School Kitchen, and a range of desserts provided 'in house'.

Following the service all the goods were transported over to St Charles to be added to the

regular Foodbank Collection every other month, organised by the small ecumenical group of Co-workers of Mother Teresa. As well as gifts from individuals, donations were received from the Methodists and RC churches, the Fell Church, St Mary's Staveley, and St Peter's Field Broughton.

In all, 23 trays of food and toiletries were donated, plus £409 in cash, most of which was Gift Aided, a



fantastic response and certainly the largest collection since we started supporting the Foodbank over 10 years ago.

Monday morning saw the laden trays



and additional large carrier bags all loaded into the van to be taken by driver Andy Wilson to the Foodbank at the back of the Baptist Church on Abbey Road, Barrow, where "the shelves are starting to look a little barren in the warehouse" – but not before calling in at St Anne's Haverthwaite for their collection.

A very big 'thank you' to all who donated so generously to help local people living in crisis.


a young family is a qualified Vet who runs her own highly successful practice near Leyburn. Malcolm, who had a long career in the centralised UK music industry, has now retired and is a

### **ECOCHURCH**






There is a reciprocal rhythm. A flow between things. A velocity of reciprocity that builds a village, builds a dream, builds the world.

Slowly, and not so softly the year turns. I came across this photo the other day and it really made an impact on me. Often we are told

really made an impact on me. Often we are told that trees are the 'lungs' of the earth yet somehow this picture captured so much more. Our lungs are like trees, and our trees are like lungs, we breathe in what trees breathe out they breathe in what we breathe out. What a partnership that is, an act of supreme reciprocity, and generosity. Trees regulate the Earth's atmosphere acting as carbon sinks. Trees help to slow down the effects of climate breakdown; they tell the seasons. Trees provide shelter and food for a myriad of creatures and animals. It's so much more than biology - it's a relationship.

# This is a lung. This is a tree.



Forest ecologist Suzanne Simard discovered the 'wood-wide web,' showing how trees communicate, share nutrients, and support one another through vast underground fungal networks (mycorrhizae). A living example of reciprocity in nature. Reciprocity is nature's way of keeping life in balance. Every living thing gives something and receives something in return. Older 'mother trees' send carbon and nutrients through these networks to younger or struggling trees, helping the forest thrive as a whole. The forest lives because everything in it gives and receives.

Nature doesn't take without giving back. Most of this relationship is invisible, and voiceless, taken for granted, ignored, or completely destroyed. PEAT screened 'Wilding' at the end of September an uplifting film about rewilding the Knepp estate, creating a rich and fertile land by moving in key species, humans getting out of the way, and leaving nature to heal the land. Truly magical to watch - transforming a lifeless dying land into one where nightingales, turtle doves, rare butterflies returned.

At the turn of the year what might our reciprocity look like, what can we give back? As the saying goes 'it's nature's world we just live in it!' And time is running out. One way of giving back is to join our growing community who do whatever they can, where they are, with what they have. 


