From the Rectory

When longings become prayer

This year was something of a record for me. I heard my first Christmas Carol in a Coffee shop at the beginning of November. It was just a bit early, I thought. When I asked a member of staff about it, she told me that the next eight weeks of Carols would probably drive her to distraction!

Each year I find myself making a similar observation. The professionally religious like me attempt to remind everyone that it's not Christmas ... just yet. First, comes this season of Advent, which has its own gifts to give, not least the capacity to wait.

At its best, Advent is a time to get in touch with our sense of 'longing'. There are many of us whose prayers are just like the prophet Isaiah who pleaded with God: "O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at your presence" (Isaiah 64.1). During these days it's time to give voice to the sense of dissatisfaction we feel that the world and our lives are not as they should be.

So, in Advent, we find ourselves alongside those who not only waited but found their longings met in the coming of Christ, the Saviour; all of which helps us understand more fully what it means for Him to be called 'Prince of Peace' and 'Emmanuel: God is With Us'.

And Advent also helps us to appreciate why Jesus taught us to pray "Thy Kingdom come". When we say the Lord's Prayer, we also acknowledge our sense that things (in our lives and the wider world) are not as they should be. We understand that, although in one sense Christ HAS come, we continue to live with a certain 'not yet'. In other words, the Kingdom, the reign of God HAS come and yet we await its fulfilment.

So, this leaves us with two pieces of encouragement. Firstly, Advent tells us that we and God's world are 'a work in progress'. St. Paul tells us, "I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ" (Philippians 1.6). In other words, God understands our incompleteness but he doesn't leave us to our own devices. We are invited to co-operate with the work of His Spirit.

Secondly, Advent teaches us to turn our longings into prayer. As someone said: "When we pray, we are at our strongest because we have surrendered the false notion that we are facing a problem AS God and instead we are finding the blessing of facing it under God".

God, grant me the serenity to accept the people I cannot change, which is pretty much everyone, since I'm clearly not you, God. At least not the last time I checked.

And while you're at it, God, please give me the courage to change what I need to change about myself, which is frankly a lot, since, once again, I'm not you, which means I'm not perfect. It's better for me to focus on changing myself than to worry about changing other people, who, as you'll no doubt remember me saying, I can't change anyway.

Finally, give me the wisdom to just shut up whenever I think that I'm clearly smarter than everyone else in the room, that no-one knows what they're talking about except me, or that I alone have all the answers.

Basically, God, grant me the wisdom to remember that I'm not you.

Deaths in the previous five years are included in the magazine, but each name in our remembrance book for the last 10 years is read out in the intercessions at St Paul's Sunday morning service.

What am I experiencing in my life, as Advent begins?

Many of us are in an ideal place to begin Advent but we don't know it. It can be tempting to think that, because we are struggling these days, we can't enter into Advent without a big change in our mood or without distancing ourselves from our real experience. Nothing could be further from the truth. Advent is about letting God come to us. We do the letting and God does the coming. In fact, the whole mystery of our faith is that God is not reluctant to come into an unusual relationship (like that of Mary and Joseph) or to be born in the poverty of a makeshift stable. We are tempted to prepare for Advent by cleaning everything up first – by, in effect, saving ourselves first. Our opening to Advent is to realize we need saving and to accept the saving love of our God.

So, what are we experiencing? That is the first Advent question. If we chew that question, then the Isaiah reading will sound so good to our ears. Are we the people "who walk in darkness" or have "thick clouds" over us? Is the way before us full of valleys and hills? Does it seem like we are in a desert? Are there wild beasts out there who are ready to devour us? Have we been guilty of some things we aren't proud of? Have we lost touch with who we really want to be? Has our fidelity become a bit shabby? Then, Isaiah proclaims that our God is ready to come and save us. And, none of the things that I see as barriers even matter to God.

Then, is Advent a passive season? No, we have work to do but it is different from what we first think it is. It starts with understanding what our preparation is. If we haven't prepared our hearts to be open to asking for salvation, we'll never shout, beg, plead, "Come, Lord, Jesus!" Our work is to become who we are. Advent is a humble season, a season of self-awareness. To say it another way; before we decorate our homes for Christmas, we have to clear away some of the false masks we might wear. These made-up identities often help us be more "presentable" to others and at times they even fool us. So, when I look in the mirror, which "me" do I see? There is nothing wrong with putting our best foot forward in public and it is quite understandable when we want others to see our best selves. But, before our own consciences and before God, we want to be transparent and real. We want to have no illusion. If there is struggle in my life – and there has to be some struggle in all our lives – then we want to acknowledge that before our God and to let that struggle be the door into Advent's graces.

How can we have hope and expect God will come to us? The readings of Advent open up a whole series of promises, full of powerful images, that keep reminding us that our God will come to save us. They free our imaginations to see and experience that coming with drama and joy – a banquet with "choice wines and rich, juicy food". They invite us to imagine when "a time will come for singing". They give us the opportunity to hope beyond our wildest hopes in the past – "the lion will lie down with the lamb" and "they will prepare for war no more". They open our hearts to imagine the love of our God embracing us in the coming of one like us, who knows

our life and its struggles and offers us the hope of the Spirit's presence with us every day, in every moment.

What are the key first steps to enter into Advent? We can all slow down. We can all breathe more deeply. We can all begin to trust that this will be a blessed time. Then, when we let ourselves be who we are, and hear the Scriptures, we can begin to quietly pray, "Come, Lord, Jesus." We might expand that prayer, in quiet moments of our days ahead, "Come into my life. I trust you don't mind if it is still messy. I believe you love me, because I need your love. I don't fear that you can't find the way to my heart. Come and fill me with peace and the love only you can give." Some of us will want to open our hands on our laps or hold up our arms in the privacy of our rooms and say out loud, "Come, Lord, Jesus, come into this house, into my family, into our struggles. Come and heal us and give us joy again. Come and unite us and let us experience, each in our own way, a bit of the joy you are offering me now."

And, before a single decoration goes up, we have prepared for the Christmas' message with the foundation of faith, with the mystery of Advent's gift. God wants to be with us. Advent is letting God's will be done in our hearts and in our everyday lives.

OUR ALTERNATIVE CHRISTMAS CARD



This Christmas Penny and I are again supporting WaterAid (we started this idea in 2007). This year's campaign is to stop 13-year -old Angeline and her family having to risk their lives to collect clean water. Their village, Taranty Bas in Madagascar, has no clean water, no taps and no toilets. Villagers need to fetch water from the Taranty river two or three times each day, carrying the water in 20-litre cans on their heads. The path to the river is narrow and steep with cactus spines pressing in on either side. The water is often infected with cholera, diarrhoea, dysentery, typhoid and polio, but the villagers have no choice.

It's difficult to believe that, in this day, so many people still have no access to clean water.

Harvest Thanksgiving is a time when we are particularly conscious of the generosity of God, and so it is a good time for us to reflect on our generosity to the Church and its work.



NEWS FROM THE DIOCESE

NATIONAL CHURCHES SURVEY

The National Churches Survey 2025 was a major project by the National Churches Trust to understand the challenges and role of church buildings in the UK. The survey, which ran from May to July 2025, found that about 5% of churches believe they may close within five years and revealed that a significant barrier to growth is a lack of volunteers. Key issues highlighted include the condition of buildings, especially roofs and heating, and the financial strain of maintenance.

KEY FINDINGS

- Threat of closure: Around 5% of churches surveyed fear they will no longer be in use as a place of worship within five years.
- **Building maintenance:** Roofs, guttering, and heating systems are the most urgent repair needs, with the condition of roofs having significantly deteriorated since 2010.
- Volunteer shortage: A lack of volunteers was identified as a major barrier to expanding community activities, with 45% of churches citing it as a significant obstacle, up from 22% in 2010.
- **Community role:** The survey confirmed that churches are vital community hubs, with the majority providing essential local support and many having accessible entrances, toilets, and kitchens.

AT THE HEART OF COMMUNITY: WHY WE NEED CHURCHES

Churches are among the most accessible community buildings in the UK and their presence fosters a sense of belonging and continuity that few other local spaces can match. What makes churches distinctive is the way in which their spiritual, social, and cultural purposes come together.

They remain, first and foremost, places of worship. In 2025, 80% of churches hold services at least weekly, confirming their ongoing role as spiritual centres at the heart of local life. They are sustained by volunteers who pour time and energy into keeping doors open, they provide spaces where the most vulnerable are welcomed and supported, and they house treasures that connect us to the past.

But their story does not stop at the altar: 58% are open beyond services, and 42% are open daily, offering a welcome that is rare among historic buildings. In rural areas especially, they are often the only space consistently open to and offered to all. This centre of community life is as relevant today as at any point in our history, with many churches extending their mission to include foodbanks, engagement programmes, concerts, art exhibitions and more.

This is a Christmas poem by Christina Rossetti. It was first published without a title in Time *Flies:* A Reading Diary in 1885. It was later included in the collection Verses in 1893 under the title *Christmastide*.

The poem has been set to music as a Christmas carol by many composers and is also sung to the traditional Irish melody *Garton*. More recently, the poem was given a modern treatment by Jars of Clay on its 2007 album, *Christmas Songs*.



American composer Jennifer Higdon set the text for solo soprano, harp and four-part chorus. A new setting by British composer David J Loxley-Blount was performed in Southwark Cathedral on 8 December 2014 by the Financial Times Choir, and was repeated by the Trafalgar Square Christmas Tree on 11 December 2014.

A busy Sunday at St Paul's

At the start of the morning service a recording of the last post was played before the two-minute's silence, and the church's wreath was presented at the altar.

In the afternoon the church was filled for the annual civic service, led by the Revd David Wilmot. Official guests included the Deputy Lieutenant, Tim Farron MP and his wife, Roger Handley (Town Mayor), along with representatives of the District and Town Councils. The Union Flag and the Standard of the Royal British Legion led the procession of clergy, followed by the banners and colours of the uniformed organisations, and finally the wreaths from the various organisations in the town were presented.



Representatives of the other churches took part in the service, and three children from the Primary School carried to the sanctuary the wooden cross that once stood over the battlefield grave of a soldier from Grange, and a choir from the school sang 'Let there be peace on earth'. The names of the men listed on the town's war memorial were read out by the Mayor.

After the church service everyone made their way down to the ornamental gardens where Flookburgh Band was already assembled for the short act of worship before the wreaths were laid on the memorial. A very wet and sodden gathering.

On Tuesday, the 11th, at 11 am on another damp day, year 6 pupils from the Primary School joined over 40 Grange residents at the war memorial in an Act of Remembrance led by the Revd Annette Miller.







MUSICALS, MOVIES AND MORE ...

An evening of classic songs and instrumental themes was promised with vocalist Amy Cockett (a busy working mother with a young family who is also a qualified vet with her own practice near Leyburn) and Mal Carruthers (an accomplished and experienced organist with a previous career in the centralized UK music industry). The interest of the audience was immediately piqued as we entered the church to a darkened auditorium with additional sound equipment, an electronic keyboard, a large video screen, and the chancel tantalisingly illuminated in a silvery-blue and white wintry light with various poppies on the Remembrance Sunday fall glowing redder than others.



There followed an eclectic and disparate selection of slides and videos, organ renditions, and vocal or electronic renderings, with a pithy and apposite video commentary from Mal, all projected through their powerful sound system. Was there a link, we questioned, as we moved from the 007 James Bond theme to *Love Actually*, *The Mission*, John Williams's *Ode to the Fallen*, a *Riverdance* line-dance, *Ave Maria*, Kate Bush, and the 633 Squadron's theme for a raid on a Nazi V2 rocket launch pad on a Norwegian fiord? Amy's voice was powerful and tuneful, Mal's artistry on the organ superb, the additional sound effects from a side drum were riveting, and the slides full of colour and memories of our cinematic past.

The second half of the programme continued with increased variety: more of John Williams, Ennio Morricone's wild themes using harmonica and güiro, Andrew Lloyd Webber's 1993 version of *Sunset Boulevard, Gladiator, Highland Cathedral* (played on the organ rather than bagpipes), Judy Garland's theme song from *The Wizard of Oz* (1938), *The Magnificent Seven* and an encore of *My Fair Lady as* Amy crooned that she "could have danced all night".

Amy sang, Mal played, the slides flashed, the amplifiers amplified, all in a seemingly wild frenzy – and then the metaphorical penny dropped. There was no over-arching theme except a serious and deep-rooted love for music and the cinema and a realization that many various arts were now, as a matter of course, combining to stimulate and please an audience's senses. There is electronic music, themes and tunes are borrowed and developed from others, music made in different ways, ideas spread and changed internationally – we saw how *The Magnificent Seven* with Yul Brynner was a take on a Japanese *The Seven Samurai*, and Lloyd Webber's 1993 *Sunset Boulevard* was openly billed as "based on the Billy Wilder (1950) film".

So, thank you to both the artistes and their wonderful sound and visual supporter Mike, for a sensually stimulating evening. We wish them "Good Luck" on their forthcoming tour of other church venues.

Some disturbing facts (extracted from *The Wonder of Wool*)

- Globally 20% of 100 billion items of clothing go unsold and are buried, shredded or incinerated.
- In the UK around 9,500 garments are dumped into British landfill every five minutes, making textiles the country's fastest growing waste stream.
- A worldwide desire for cheap cashmere means that goats have taken over much of the flatlands of Mongolia, putting its human population at risk of famine.
- Farmers with vast flocks in Australia now give their sheep artificial feed as there's no more grass.
- In 2023 a sheep cost £2 to sheer, but 130 fleeces sold to British Wool fetched just £17.50—barely enough to cover the £15 cost of delivery, so many farmers simply bury or burn their fleeces.
- A 2024 study found that the average litre of bottled water contains some 240,000 detectable plastic fragments that pass into human blood with unknown health effects.


"For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life".


God gave us the perfect Gift when He gave us Jesus!

A TAPESTRY OF WORDS AND MUSIC TO CELEBRATE ST CECILIA

What a superb concert Charles had arranged for us and how we all enjoyed the selection of tunes and readings by Audrey. It was all absolutely wonderful.



St Cecilia, the virginal patron of music and musicians, is remembered as having sung in her heart throughout her marriage ceremony in the 3rd century AD, and we hummed and tapped and nodded our heads to familiar tunes brilliantly executed on the piano by a team of three accomplished pianists – Charles plus David Edmonds and Wendy Nicholas – playing as a team of six hands or occasionally as duets. And this is to

Audrey had chosen a number of beautiful, as well as amusing, pieces, starting with Joyce Grenfell's *Stately as a Galleon* and she sailed through the musical numbers with pieces from Charles Dickens and Thomas Hardy, plus Jerome K. Jerome and others, to give a verbal feast of humour and evocative description as vital interludes to the music. All her pieces were carefully chosen, all most apt and perfectly delivered. We almost wept as she described how she had taken her harp to a party but nobody asked her to play.

It was all great fun and had clearly taken a great deal of time, selecting, putting together, rehearsing and polishing, and we are grateful to Charles and the three

artistes for their time and dedication. We were reminded at the end that the next "show" is 6th June when we shall celebrate the inauguration of the church organ some 150 years ago. Please note the date in your diaries and come along for a further feast.

And, on that note, we also thank our catering team who provided soup, scones, beverages and biscuits beforehand. It was a wonderful and most agreeable afternoon in every way.


